




Programme: NOVATO 2021 Date: 19th November 2021 Time: 2:00 PM to 4:30 PM Platform: MS Teams



Social Work intervention by II MSW Students




Social work students with Mr.Panalisamy. Happy faces with pension amount.



Well-Known Social Worker

Tulsi Gowda is thought by environmentalists as the "Encyclopaedia of Forest" and by her tribe as the "tree goddess" due to her large knowledge of woodland and all of the plants that grow within it. She is renowned for her ability to perceive the mother tree of each species of tree within the wooded area regardless of its vicinity. Tulsi Gowda was born in 1944 in the Halakki tribe of the Honnalli village, a settlement transitioning between rural and urban inside the Uttara Kannada district in the Indian state of Karnataka. Karnataka is a state in South India that is recognised for its popular eco-tourism places as it has over twenty-five natural world sanctuaries and five national parks.

Tulsi Gowda also has a grasp on seed collecting. Seed amassing is the extraction of seeds from mother trees so that they will regenerate and regrow complete plant species. It is a very hard procedure because the seeds must be gathered at the height of germination from the mother tree so that it will ensure the survival of the seedlings, and Gowda is able to decipher exactly when this time is. This extraction of seeds is specifically useful within the Karnataka Forestry Department as they describe their 4 essential goals as "regulatory, protection, conservation, and sustainable management."

Outside of environmentalism, Tulsi Gowda has also championed for girls rights inside her village. When another Halakki female was threatened with a gun after an altercation, Gowda came to her aid stating that she will 'protest fiercely if the culprit of the crime isn't punished'.

- In 1986, she received the Indira Priyadarshini Vrikshamitra Award, also known as the IPVM award.
- The Karnataka Rajyotsava Award in 1999
- On 26 January 2020, the Government of India rewarded Tulsi Gowda with the prestigious Padma Shri award, the fourth highest award given to citizens of India.

The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016

The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 is the handicap enactment passed by the Indian Parliament to satisfy its commitment to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, which India sanctioned in 2007. The Act supplanted the current Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995.

The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Bill, 2014 was brought into the Parliament on 7 February 2014 and passed by the Lok Sabha on 14 December 2016. The Rajya Sabha passed the Bill on 16 December 2016 and got the President's consent on 27 December 2016. The Act became functional on 19 April 2017. The Central Government rules 2017 have been advised under Section 100 of the Act and have come into power with impact from 15 June 2017.

Salient Features of RPwD Act 2016

Disability has been defined based on an evolving and dynamic concept.

The types of disabilities have been increased from existing 7 to 21 and the Central Government will have the power to add more types of disabilities. The 21 disabilities are given below: Physical Disability such as locomotor disability, leprosy cured person, cerebral palsy, dwarfism, muscular dystrophy, acid attack victims, visual impairment, blindness, low vision, hearing impairment, speech and language disability.

Intellectual Disability such as specific learning disabilities, autism spectrum disorder.

Mental Behaviour (Mental Illness)

Disability caused due to- chronic neurological conditions such as multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease and blood disorder such as haemophilia, thalassemia, sickle cell disease.

Multiple Disabilities.

Rights and entitlements

Responsibility has been cast upon the appropriate governments to take effective measures to ensure that the persons with disabilities enjoy their rights equally with others.

Additional benefits such as reservation in higher education (not less than 5%), government jobs (not less than 4 %), reservation in allocation of land, poverty alleviation schemes (5% allotment) etc. have been provided for persons with benchmark disabilities and those with high support needs.

Every child with benchmark disability between the age group of 6 and 18 years shall have the right to free education.

Government funded educational institutions as well as the government recognized institutions will have to provide inclusive education to the children with disabilities.

For strengthening the Prime Minister's Accessible India Campaign, stress has been given to ensure accessibility in public buildings (both Government and private) in a prescribed time-frame.

Guardianship

The Act provides for grant of guardianship by District Court

under which there will be joint decision – making between the guardian and the persons with disabilities.

Establishment of Authorities

Broad-based Central & State Advisory Boards on Disability are to be set up to serve as apex policy-making bodies at the Central and State level. The Office of Chief Commissioner of Persons with Disabilities has been strengthened who will now be assisted by 2 Commissioners and an Advisory Committee comprising of not more than 11 members drawn from experts in various disabilities. Similarly, the office of State Commissioners of Disabilities has been strengthened who will be assisted by an Advisory Committee comprising of not more than 5 members drawn from experts in various disabilities. The Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities and the State Commissioners will act as regulatory bodies and Grievance Redressal agencies and also monitor implementation of the Act. District-level committees will be constituted by the State Governments to address local concerns of PwDs. Details of their constitution and the functions of such committees would be prescribed by the State Governments in the rules. Creation of National and State Fund will be created to provide financial support to persons with disabilities. The existing National Fund for Persons with Disabilities and the Trust Fund for Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities will be subsumed with the National Fund.

Penalties for offences

The Act provides for penalties for offences committed against persons with disabilities and also violation of the provisions of the new law.

Any person who violates provisions of the Act, or any rule or regulation made under it, shall be punishable with imprisonment up to six months and/ or a fine of Rs 10,000, or both. For any subsequent violation, imprisonment of up to two years and/or a fine of Rs 50,000 to Rs five lakh can be awarded.

Whoever intentionally insults or intimidates a person with disability, or sexually exploits a woman or child with disability, shall be punishable with imprisonment between six months to five years and fine.

Special Courts will be designated in each district to handle cases concerning violation of rights of PwDs.

Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana / Kanyashree Prakalpa – West Bengal

Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana

Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana is a small deposit scheme for girl child which would fetch an attractive interest rate and provide income tax rebate. The account can be opened in any post office or a public sector bank and on the date of account opening, the child's age should be less than 10 years. The scheme primarily ensures equitable share to a girl child in resources and savings of a family in which she is generally discriminated against a male child. The account may be opened with an initial deposit of Rs 250 and thereafter any amount in multiple of one hundred rupees may be deposited subject to the condition that a minimum of Rs. 250 shall be deposited in a financial year but the total money deposited in an account on a single occasion or on multiple occasions shall not exceed Rs.1,50,000 in a financial year. Compulsory deposits need to be made until 14 years from the date of the opening of the account. No premature withdrawal is permitted, however, to meet the financial requirements for the purpose of higher education or marriage of the girl child, a maximum of 50% of the deposit amount can be withdrawn once she reaches the age of 18. The account shall mature on the completion of 21 years from the date of opening of the account or when the marriage of the girl child takes place, whichever happens earlier. On maturity, the balance including interest outstanding in the account shall be payable to the account holder on production of withdrawal slip along with the pass book.

Kanyashree Prakalpa – West Bengal

Kanyashree Prakalpa is an initiative taken by the government of West Bengal in order to improve the lives of girls who belong to the economically backward families. Its purpose is to curb child marriages and help girls to complete their formal education. It has been designed in such a manner that it ensures that the girls continue their education and delay their marriages at least till the age of eighteen. The scheme has two conditional cash benefit components (i) K1 – an annual scholarship of Rs. 1000/- to be paid annually to girls between the age group of 13 – 18 years of age for every year that they remain in school, provided that they are unmarried at the time, and (ii) K2 – a one time grant of Rs. 25000/-, to pe paid when the girls turn 18, provided that they remain in the field of education and are unmarried at that time. As more and more girls remain in school, it is envisaged that they will use the opportunity to gain skills and knowledge that will help them become economically independent. Even if girls do get married soon after they turn 18, it is expected that their education and enhanced social and emotional development will give them a better foundation for their adult lives. And over time, as entire generations of women enter marriages only after they have some degree of economic independence, it is expected that the practice of child marriage is completely eradicated, and women will attain their right to health, education and socio-economic equality.

This scheme has been lauded by various national and international organizations including the United Nations.

1. NITI Aayog launches SDGs Urban Index 2021-22

NITI Aayog launched "Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Urban Index and Dashboard 2021-22". Shimla has topped the list of cities by scoring highest on the index. Coimbatore and Chandigarh have been ranked at second and third positions respectively. Thiruvananthapuram, Panaji, Pune, Kochi, Tiruchirappalli, Ahmedabad and Nagpur are among top 10 cities on the index. It ranks 56 urban areas on 77 SDG indicators across targets like zero hunger, ending poverty, quality education, good health and wellbeing, gender equality etc in the SDG framework.

2. Chhattisgarh Panchayat Provisions (Extension of the Scheduled) Rules,2021

Government of Chhattisgarh has formulated draft rules called "Chhattisgarh Panchayat Provisions (Extension of the Scheduled) Rules, 2021", under PESA Act, 1996.PESA Act stands for "Panchayat (Extension of the Scheduled Areas) Act, 1996". This act was enacted by the Central government to ensure self-governance through Gram Sabhas for people in scheduled areas. The act recognises the right of tribal communities & residents of scheduled areas, legally in order to govern themselves through their own systems of self-government. It also acknowledges the traditional rights of tribals over natural resources. Six states have already formed the PESA laws. Chhattisgarh will become the seventh state to have PESA Laws, if the rules are enacted.

3. IQAir: 94 of 100 most polluted cities in India, China, Pakistan

According to air quality tracker "IQAir", air pollution continues to present a big health hazard to people across the world. According to IQAir data, India has 46 of the world's 100 most polluted cities in 2020. India is followed by China (with 42 cities), Pakistan (with 6 cities), Bangladesh (with 4 cities), Indonesia (with 1 city), and Thailand (with 1 city). All these cities had PM2.5 air-quality rating of more than 50.India accounts for 9 of the top 10 most polluted cities worldwide. Air Pollution contributes to around 7 million premature deaths per annum. Out of these deaths, 600000 are children.

4. Kerala to launch Mobile app for Waste Disposal

Kerala government is set to launch a mobile application to improve and track the collection of inorganic waste across local self-governing bodies. Smart garbage mobile app will be launched across all six municipal corporations, 300 village bodies and 70-odd municipalities in the initial phase. Launch of the mobile app will make waste disposal more efficient. App will be deployed to manage and realise the quantity of inorganic waste collected from households. It will also explain how waste has to be treated. Each household will be given QR codes, which will be used to obtain details of waste being generated. This app will enable all local bodies and departments to track waste collection. Waste collection will be tracked by volunteers of state poverty alleviation and women empowerment programme called Kudumbashree Mission. These volunteers are known as Haritha Karma sena. They would be provided with smartphones as part of the project to track the waste collection.

5. India gets re-elected to UNESCO Executive Board

On November 17, 2021, India was re-elected to the executive board of UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Sci-

entific and Cultural Organization) for the term of 2021-2025. India was re-elected with 164 votes. Among Group IV Asian & Pacific States, Japan, Vietnam, Philippines, Cook Islands and China were also elected. UNESCO is a specialised agency of the United Nations (UN). It aims to promote world peace & security through international cooperation in education, science, arts, and culture.



Russia has started the delivery of the S-400 missile system to India, in a bid to boost India's air-defence capabilities. The S-400 is considered as the most advanced air-defence system worldwide. The missile is capable of protecting its air defence bubble against missiles, rockets, cruise missiles and aircraft. This system is available with China, and was deployed along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Ladakh, amid military standoff with India. Russia started the delivery for deployment on schedule in 2021.

India bought this system for US\$ 5 billion in 2018. This deal between India and Russia became contentious amid a threat of sanctions from the United States on countries engaging in defence deals with Russia. India had bought five units of the S-400 system in 2018, for which it had made the first tranche of the payment of \$800 million in 2019.

7. Norovirus confirmed in Wayanad, Kerala

First case of Norovirus was confirmed in Wayanad district of Kerala. Norovirus is an animal-borne disease. It is transmitted through contaminated water and food. Following the confirmation of the case, Health Minister Veena George issued guidelines and urged people to be vigilant for the same.

People were directed to intensify preventive activities and to spread awareness regarding the disease. Common symptoms of Norovirus include abdominal pain, diarrhoea, fever, vomiting, headache, nausea, and body aches. Acute vomiting and diarrhoea might lead to dehydration and other complications.

8.Mission Ganga enters Guinness Book of World Records

On the first day of Ganga Utsav (The River Festival 2021), National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG) got registered in the Guinness Book of World Records. It was registered in the Guinness Book because a record number of photos of handwritten notes were uploaded on Facebook in an hour. The Ganga Utsav event was organised to raise awareness on Ganga rejuvenation as well as to provide impetus to the reach of the event. 5th edition of Ganga Utsav virtually started with fun and festivities. The festival will celebrate the glory of river Ganga as well as other rivers of India.

9. "Don't Choose Extinction": UNDP Video on Climate Change

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) released a creative video titled "Don't Choose Extinction" on Climate Change. In the video, UNDP highlights that it is high time to act on the climate crisis and it is time to do whatever it takes. The viral video shows a dinosaur, to pass a simple message to the world leaders & diplomats: "It's now or never. Don't choose extinction. Save human species, before it's too late."
