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
DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITES



BSW STUDENTS GAIN CREATIVE SKILLS THROUGH MOTION DESIGN WORKSHOP

The Department of Mass Communication organized a 4-day workshop on Motion Design with Adobe After Effects on August 1, 6, 7, and 8, 2025, at Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham, Coimbatore. The expert sessions were conducted by Mr. Rahul Siddhan, Creative Designer and Motion Graphics Mentor, who guided students through practical and beginner-friendly lessons.

During the workshop, students were introduced to tools like Adobe After Effects, Photoshop, and Illustrator. They learned to animate logos, drawings, and concepts, build motion-based presentation videos, and export their work for portfolios, reels, and digital platforms. The sessions were highly interactive and hands-on, helping students gain confidence in using creative digital tools. The program was open to students from the Department of Mass Communication, School of Architecture, and School of Social and Behavioural Sciences. Our 2nd year BSW students actively participated in the workshop, exploring how motion design can be applied in presentations, social awareness campaigns, and creative documentation. The experience provided them with valuable digital skills that will strengthen both their academic projects and future social work initiatives.

PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOP

He was asked to develop in students the interest in the art of taking photos from their most accessible camera, their smartphone. He taught students about the Triangle of Exposure and explained Aperture, ISO and Shutter Speed in



great detail. Additionally, he mentioned the best way to use these elements to enhance their photos. For example, he described how ISO can be used to capture the mood in situations where aperture and shutter speed cannot be adjusted. Furthermore, he demonstrated the way in which flash photos can be taken for formal situations and if quality of the photographs is too low.

Mr. Dileep elucidated the importance of the immortal 'Rule of Thirds', while also highlighting the importance of grid lines while trying to capture the best shot. He emphasized on the significance of natural lighting like the golden hour, just before the sunrise and sunset, in capturing beautiful photographs.

The students enjoyed immensely and continued to approach him to ask for his advice on various queries they had. All things considered, Mr. Dileep Raj encouraged the students to consistently attempt to improve their photography skills through practice and persistence. He reiterated the importance of capturing the importance moments of life, even if it means one must sacrifice the quality of the resulting photographs.



Inaugural Session



The seminar started conventionally with a Prayer and Lighting Up of the Lamp to signify the removal of ignorance with knowledge and wisdom.

The inaugural session started with a Welcome Address by Dr. S. Kanagaraj, Seminar Convener. The Welcome Address was followed by a Benedictory Address rendered by Swami Tapasyamritananda Puri, which laid down an introspective approach to the overall seminar.

The Keynote Address was given by Prof.(Dr.) G. Gopa Kumar, Former Vice Chancellor, Central University of Kerala. He tried to address the synchronizing elections with the challenges reflective of the federal and democratic process in India.

The Chief Guest Address was given by Sri. Narayanan Thirupathy, Independent Director of REC Ltd. and Chief Spokesperson of the BJP in Tamil Nadu, primarily discussed how 'One Nation, One Election' can bring about governance stability and assurance of fiscal responsibility.

Another significant event of the Inaugural session was the release of the Book of Abstracts with 27 abstracts provided by scholars and researchers throughout the country. The Inaugural session ended with a Vote of Thanks by Dr. V. Priya, Chairperson, Department of Social Work.



Day 1: 28th of August

The first day included five lead papers which discussed political plurality, governance, federalism and democracy from citizen perspectives. PhD scholars and post-graduate students presented papers on the themes of grassroots democracy, youth responses, and the impact of frequent elections on what they termed electoral volatility.

The Chairs made the following key recommendations:

- ONOE must safeguard plurality and inclusiveness in Indian politics.
- Require more rigorous empirical analysis to substantiate assertions about impacts rooted in governance.
- Institutional safeguards must be put in place to address the regional parties.

The Chairs made the following corrections:

- Presenters were encouraged to improve their methodological frameworks, drawing upon comparative federalism and political studies.
- Scholars were directed to make more differentiation in definitions of 'governance' and 'federalism', as they had substantial overlap.
- For student papers, the Chairs made recommendations for a sharper connection of ONOE and youth participation and to move towards more direct electoral issues.





Day 2: 29th of August

The second day comprised of seven lead papers regarding the governance continuity, socio-political conscience, and the legal-constitutional dimension of the challenge, and students and scholars presented supplementary papers on comparative electoral practice and administrative readiness.

Key recommendations made by Chairs (Day 2):

- Municipal and state pilot implementation.
- The Election Commission needs capacity building to oversee synchronous polls.
- Youth and marginalized communities need physical space in ONOE discussions to not be left out.
- Constitutional safeguards are needed to ensure central command does not loom large over state autonomy.

Corrections as proposed by Chairs (Day 2):

- Scholars were asked to distinguish fiscal implications and political implications in their arguments.
- Papers were altered to address comparative international experiences with an academic lens.
- Legal papers were amended by suggesting clearer referrals to constitutional articles of relevance to ONOE.

Panel Discussion & Deliberations

Interactive discussions with senior scholars, students, and policymakers provided insights about:

- Finding a delicate balance between efficiency and democratic representation.
- Fostering concepts of federalism while exploring ONOE reforms.
- Learning comparative lessons from other democracies that have used synchronized election systems.

Outcomes & Recommendations

- Consensus Building: Political and regional parties must continue to have central roles in the reforms conversation.
- Phased Approach: Local and state elections should go first, with the national rollout last.
- Protecting Federalism: ONOE cannot undermine the voices of states and regional communities.
- Institutional Readiness: The Election Commission needs to be equipped with adequate human resources, infrastructure, and logistics.
- Youth & Citizens Role: Dedicated communication and action needs to be taken to ensure citizens, particularly the youth, are part of the ONOE discourse.
- Academic Reflections: Chairs implored presenters to incorporate comparative practice, better conceptual frameworks, and more depth on the constitutional aspects of their papers.

Conclusion

In conclusion, the National Seminar served as a very good forum for academic discussions and productive dialogue about one of the most significant issues, One Nation, One Election which Indian

democracy currently faces. There were 27 abstracts compiled, 12 lead papers delivered and a variety of contributions presented by research scholars and students. The seminar engaged a variety of voices, viewpoints and perspectives.


The conversations during the seminar acknowledged both the possibilities of ONOE and challenges about it. While it could reduce costs and help with continuity of governance, the same attention must be put to requirements for constitutional safeguards, the balance of federalism and inclusion. The recommendations made by our Chairs, and the goodwill needed for constructive corrections, as proposed during the presentations of the papers enriched the quality of the seminar and offered academic value. The insights shared by them will be helpful for future research, policy development, and democratic reform.







PROMOTION AND REGULATION OF ONLINE GAMING ACT, 2025



The Government of India has now introduced into Parliament the Promotion and Regulation of Online Gaming Act, 2025, a historic move to introduce order and accountability to the booming digital gaming market. As online gaming has become extremely popular among youth, issues were cropping up about its addictive character, economic risk, and accessing gambling-like elements. To solve these problems, the new Act creates an independent regulator body to oversee online gaming activities, make rules, and ensure compliance nationwide. Perhaps the most important provision of the law is the blanket ban on money-based online games, which has already led to the blocking of various popular apps. This Act is aimed at children and young people to be protected from the ill effects of betting and gambling online, which are mainly causing loss and emotional turmoil. The Act has been welcomed in good faith by parents and teachers because they believe that it will act as an intervention that will secure the future generation. Meanwhile, observers note that the true success of the law rests on how seriously it is enforced because good regulation and monitoring would be required to guarantee that the gaming industry matures well but at the same time offers clean and healthy diversion.

TAMIL NADU CHIEF MINISTER'S GIRL CHILD PROTECTION SCHEME – II



The Government of Tamil Nadu, in its Social Welfare and Women Empowerment Department, has launched the Chief Minister's Girl Child Protection Scheme-II to benefit poor families, enhance education among girls, improve small family norms, and prevent female infanticide and gender discrimination.

Under the scheme, a fixed deposit of ₹25,000 in the name of a maximum of two girl children belonging to one family. A receipt of the FD is provided to the family, and it is renewed after five years.

The girl gets the matured amount with interest when she turns 18, if she has sat for the 10th standard public exam. The scheme is open only to families with a yearly income of less than ₹72,000. Parents or grandparents should be born in Tamil Nadu or have been continuous residents of the state for a minimum period of 10 years on the date of application. The facility is also available for girl children of Sri Lankan Tamil refugees who stay in refugee camps in Tamil Nadu.

NATIONAL AWARDS TO TEACHERS

Details

Inaugurated in 1958 by the Ministry of Education (MoE), the National Awards to Teachers scheme pays tribute and acknowledges the special roles played by some of the best teachers of the nation. The awards are given to those teachers who, with their dedication and perseverance, have made a positive difference in the lives of their pupils and augmented the standard of school education. The awards are carried out under the over-all guidance of the Ministry of Education.

Benefits

Public honors are given by the President of Indiaor the Vice President of India on 5th September (Teachers' Day) annually.

The awards mark the meritorious service of primary, middle, and secondary school teachers, appreciating their efforts in enhancing education and influencing the lives of students.

Eligibility

1. School Teachers and Heads of Schools who work in recognized primary, middle, high, and higher secondary schools are eligible, including: State Governments/Union Territories, local bodies, and government-aided school-run schools. Central Government institutions like Kendriya Vidyalayas (KVs), Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas (JNVs), Sainik Schools (MoD), Atomic Energy Education Society (AEES) schools, and Eklavya Model Residential Schools (EMRS).

Private schools affiliated with State/UT Boards.

CBSE-affiliated schools (other than included above).

CISCE affiliated schools (other than the above).

- 2. Only regular teachers and school Heads with at least 10 years of service qualify.
- 3. Retired teachers are not usually entitled, but those who have worked for at least four months during the year of award (up to 30th April) could be considered.

Exclusions

Teachers who have retired but have not worked for at least four months in the award year.

Education Administrators, Inspectors of Education, and training institute staff.



1. UNDP Report on Forest Rights Act Progress

The UNDP's 2025 report on India's Forest Rights Act (FRA) 2006 shows that progress in giving land rights to forest-dwelling people is very slow. So far, only 18% of the land that should be recognized has been covered. The report looked at three states Chhattisgarh, Maharashtra, and Odisha and found that poor record-keeping, missing documents, and conflicts between different government departments are major problems. To fix these issues, the report suggests setting a deadline for completing land claims, improving teamwork between departments, including forest plans made by local village councils, and focusing on gender equality by supporting women's leadership and their livelihoods.

2. Myanmar Declares Karen National Union a Terrorist Group

Myanmar's military government announced in August 2025 that the Karen National Union (KNU), a major ethnic rebel group that has been fighting for more freedom since 1948, is a terrorist group. This means anyone helping the KNU could face legal trouble. The decision happens as the country's civil war gets worse and just before the military plans to hold elections in December 2025.

3. US Ends De Minimis Rule, India-US Trade Faces Disruptions

The US stopped its De Minimis rule on August 29, 2025. This rule had let people bring in goods worth less than \$800 per day without paying duties. This change messed up e-commerce and mail services between the US and India. After the rule ended, India Post stopped most packages going to the US, which hurt millions of customers and small businesses. These businesses send things like clothes, jewelry, electronics, and medicines to the US. The change was announced by President Donald Trump. It replaced a simpler way of importing goods with a more complicated one called Entry Type 11.



4. TRAI Approves 8 Digital Connectivity Rating Agencies

The Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) has given the green light to eight companies to act as Digital Connectivity Rating Agencies (DCRAs) under

the new Digital Connectivity Regulations set for 2024. These agencies will be up and running for five years starting August 27, 2025. They'll evaluate homes using a standard approach and provide ratings based on several factors like fiber readiness, mobile signal strength, broadband speed, Wi-Fi quality, and the overall user experience.

5.Accelerated Rainfall Changes in India **Expose** Climate Holes in **Models** Accelerated changes in rainfall in India are happening faster than expected, revealing flaws in current climate models. Recent studies show that the extreme rainfall events predicted for 2040 are already occurring. In June 2025, India experienced 502 very heavy rainfall events, the most in recent decades, surpassing the 494 events recorded in 2023. Scientists say the existing climate models do not accurately predict how quickly and how much these changes are happening, as they were designed to show such increases much later in the century.



India-Bhutan Completes 1020 MW **Punatsangch-Hydropower Project** hu-II The 1020 MW Punatsangchhu-II Hydroelectric Project in Bhutan was completed in August 2025 with the commissioning of its last unit into the national grid. Financed entirely by India, the project adds around 40% to Bhutan's installed power capacity, enhances regional energy security, and has already produced more than 1.3 billion units of electricity, earning nearly Nu 4.9 billion.

7.ITBP and Indian Army Participate in Joint Operation Achook Prahar in Arunachal Pradesh

To assess combat effectiveness and operational synergy at high altitudes, the Spear Corps of the Indian Army and the Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) conducted Achook Prahar from 25-28 August 2025 in central Arunachal Pradesh. The four-day drill integrated the use of mortars, machine guns, rockets, and grenades, showcasing interoperability under simulated battle conditions. As a result of ITBP's mountain warfare specialization and the Army's firepower, the exercise greatly improved securing sensitive areas along the India China borders and improved coordination, communication, and rapid response measures.



Shadow Schooling is Growing in India, Indi-Government cates Survey According to a government survey of recent student enrollment patterns, public or government schooling is still predominant with just over half (56%) of students enrolled in government schools (largely in rural India). Nevertheless, shadow schooling a trend in which students study outside of school hours, typically in the form of private coaching or tuition grew to nearly one in three students in India. If urban families spent heavily on tuition, students in government schools didn't cost much.

9. India Conducts India-**Integrated Air** enous fence Weapon System Tests India successfully completed the first flight test of its indigenous Integrated Air Defence Weapon System (IADWS) off the coast of Odisha, designed to detect and destroy enemy aircraft, drones, and missiles with 35 km range. The IADWS incorporates a Quick Reaction Surface-to-Air Missile (30 km), VSHORADS (6 km), and a laser-based Directed Energy Weapon (4 km) all supported by a Centralised Command and Control Centre developed by DRDL. The indigenous integrated air defence weapons system is the culmination of decades of DRDO missile venture with the Integrated Guided Missile Development Programme (IGMDP) (1982-2007) and combined with various other development areas, and involved many DRDO labs and private partners, and international partners. The IADWS is an add-on to India's layered air defence, restricting dependence on foreign technology, and strengthening the self-reliance of counter modern airborne threats.



10. New Mahout Village for **Elephants Caretakers Opened** by Tamil Nadu in Anamalai Range of the Tiger Reserve A new Mahout Village has been opened in the Anamalai Tiger Reserve in Tamil Nadu. It's located at the Kozhikamuthi giant camp. This is the alternate Mahout Village in the state, following the one established before this time in Theppakadu, Mudumalai. The new vill offers ultramodern homes, clean toilets, and fun conditioning for 47 mahouts and cavadies from the Malasar lineage. The design is meant to ameliorate their living conditions and help them make a stronger connection with the mammoths they watch for.
