
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BOOK REVIEW

THE 5AM CLUB -Robin Sharma

Motivating! Change your life! When discussing Robin Sharma's best-selling book, The 5 AM Club, these are just a few adjectives that spring to mind. For anyone looking to change their life and cover the route for success on both a personal and professional level, this book is an indispansable resource. Sharma's way of storytelling, along with his priceless intuition and useful guidance, make this book the way that Sharma explores the importance of self-mastery and personal development is among the most spectacular features of The 5 AM Club. He stresses that success in all facets of life depends on setting aside time in the early morning to work on oneself. He inspires readers to take control of their life by leading them on a journey of self-discovery through loving characters and captivating stories.Sharma presents the idea of the "20/20/20 formula," which divides the first hour of the day into three equal components: growth, reflection, and exercise. By using this technique, people can optimize their mental, emotional, and physical health and set the stage for a productive day.



ARTICLE 15

Anubhav Sinha's Article 15 is a powerful and unflinching portrayal of caste-based discrimination in modern-day India. Loosely inspired by true events such as the 2014 Badaun case, the film draws its name from Article 15 of the Indian Constitution, which prohibits discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex, or place of birth. The story follows IPS officer Ayan Ranjan (played by Ayushmann Khurrana), a privileged urban man who is posted in a rural town in Uttar Pradesh. His idealistic worldview is shaken when he is faced with the brutal realities of caste violence and systemic oppression. The discovery of the bodies of two Dalit girls hanging from a tree sets off a disturbing investigation that exposes deep-rooted corruption, indifference, and caste hierarchies.

Ayushmann Khurrana delivers a restrained yet impactful performance as an outsider who slowly awakens to the harsh truths of the system. What sets Article 15 apart is its courage to confront uncomfortable truths. It doesn't attempt to provide easy answers or wrap the story with a neat resolution. Instead, it serves as a wake-up call, reminding viewers that despite legal safeguards, discrimination and injustice continue to plague Indian society.While the film may feel heavy-handed in some portions and leans on the outsider-as-savior trope, its intentions are clear and its message vital. It opens up space for conversation on caste inequality and institutional apathy—topics often brushed under the carpet.







ACTS

THE TRIBHUVAN SAHKARI UNIVERSITY ACT, 2025



The Tribhuvan Sahkari University Act, 2025 creates the Tribhuvan Sahkari University for promoting specialized education, research, and training in the cooperative sector, in harmony with the national vision of "Sahkar Se Samriddhi" (Prosperity through Cooperation). The Act elevates the Institute of Rural Management Anand (IRMA) to national college status under the university, which will provide it with ongoing autonomy and recognition as a Center of Excellence in Rural Management. The action will further enhance cooperative education and leadership in India, particularly in rural and disadvantaged areas.

The university is authorized to award degrees, open campuses in India and overseas, and affiliate other insti-

tutions, thus enhancing its academic reach and impact. The university's aim is to disseminate quality education and capacity development in cooperative management, and encourage research focused on real-life issues confronting cooperative societies and rural communities. The Act also stresses innovation and practical training as integral components of the university's academic programs.

To guarantee efficient operation and excellence, the university will be run through a comprehensive governance system that involves different councils and boards. These include curriculum governance through academic councils, institutional management through administrative bodies, and financial boards to provide transparency and accountability in funding and resources allocation. This system aligns with the vision of the university to become a top university in cooperative education and development.

Essentially, the Act not only institutionalizes a forum for collaborative learning and innovation but also responds to national development aspirations by empowering rural communities and promoting inclusive economic growth. Tribhuvan Sahkari university positions the agreeable demonstrate as a well-rewarding instrument for maintainable advancement, learning, and social value.

FREE LAPTOP SCHEME 2025

Kerala Free Laptop Scheme



The Kerala Free Laptop Scheme 2025 is a social welfare scheme launched by the state government with an aim to benefit economically weaker section students by offering free laptops to them. The scheme is aimed at the purpose

of making sure that every student, whether from a poor or rich family, is equipped with digital learning tools because they are the most important part of the current education system. The scheme is for those students who cleared their 10th standard (SSLC) in the academic year 2023-24 successfully. For eligibility, the student should be a permanent resident of Kerala, and family income should not be more than ₹1.5 lakh per annum. Apart from this, the candidates should fulfill academic criteria too candidates under the state syllabus should have scored at least a "B" grade in all the subjects, whereas candidates coming from CBSE or ICSE boards should have marks of not less than 70%. Students belonging to Below Poverty Line (BPL) families will be given preference. Applications need to be filled online through the government official website, with the necessary documents like mark sheets, income certificates, proof of residency, and BPL certification. The scheme not only bridges the digital divide among students but also encourages level playing field opportunities in education. Students and their parents are requested to be careful and not fall for counterfeit schemes propagated in unofficial websites or social media websites. The initiative by the Kerala government through this scheme shows its willingness to empower youth by making technology available, thereby making them able to contribute completely in a technologically dominated learning process.

CENTRAL SCHEME

MINISTRY OF DEFENCE: AGNIPATH YOJANA



On 14th June 2022, a new youth reclamation policy named Agnipath was approved by the Union Cabinet. Under this policy, young individuals will serve in the military forces compelled four times and will be referred to as Agniveers. The objective is to recruit energetic, patriotic youth and have a youngish profile among the forces. Agnipath is an ultramodern HR program for the Army, Navy, and Air Force. Agniveers who join the Indian Air Force will be governed by the Air Force Act, 1950. They will be recruited from all over India through online tests, trade rallies, and lot interviews at ITIs and similar establishments. Agniveers will

have a special rank, which will be distinct from the normal bones. All Agniveers will have to accept terms of the scheme.


After four service cycles, every Agniveer will revert to mercenary life again, based on performance and merit, 25 from each batch could be given a shot at joining the regular IAF skeleton. This is not a certainty and is subject to the government's discretion. The person designated to the regular force has to serve out their four- time stint as Agniveers first. Medical tradesmen alone can be signed directly outside of this scheme. Agniveers shall receive a remuneration package consisting of threat and hardship allowances when due. After four instances, they shall receive a SevaNidhi — a onetime payment consisting of their own savings and an equal contribution by the government, along with interest.

Candidates should be Indian nationals advanced 17.5 to 23 times for the 2022 input, and 17.5 to 21 times for post-batches. They also need to fulfill the educational, physical, and medical standards of the Army, Navy, or Air Force.

CURRENT AFFAIRS



MAY 2025

1. Wildfires and Climate Change:

Global warming is increasing the threat of wildfires worldwide and bringing overlapping fire seasons to western North America and eastern Australia, and coordination among fire services in Canada, the U.S., and Australia is becoming increasingly complicated. Fire weather, fueled by heat, humidity, rain, and wind, is measured by the Canadian Fire Weather Index. North America's fire season was June to October and Australia's October to March, with room for resources to be shared.

2. Vizhinjam International Seaport:

Inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala, the Vizhinjam International Seaport is India's first deep-water transshipment port, built through a public-private partnership by Adani Ports. Strategically situated barely 10 nautical miles from important international shipping routes, the semi-automated port, which cost ₹8,867 crore, was financed in part by the Kerala government. Its goal is to recover India's transshipment traffic from Colombo in order to increase income and save foreign cash. Trial operations started in July 2024, and commercial operations started in December 2024.



3.Operation Sindoor

One of India's largest cross-border operations since the 2019 Balakot attacks, Operation Sindoor, was initiated in early May 2025 and involved a significant counterterrorism effort that targeted nine terrorist facilities in Pakistan. Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM) and Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) infrastructure, the operation targeted locations in Bahawalpur, Kotli, Muridke, Sialkot, Narow, Bhimber, and Muzaffarabad, areas known to support extremist activities. JeM's Markaz Subhan Allah, connected to the 2019 Pulwama assault, and LeT's Markaz Taiba, which provided training to the 26/11 Mumbai attackers, were among the main targets.



4. TShiv Shakti Point Identified as Key Site for Studying Moon's Primitive Mantle

Researchers from the Physical Research Laboratory (PRL) have

determined that the Chandrayaan-3 landing site on the southern high-latitude highlands of the Moon, known as the Shiv Shakti point, is a crucial site for the study of primitive mantle materials, which will provide information about the Moon's early geological past. This was accomplished on August 23, 2023, marking India's first successful lunar landing.



5. Clumpiness of the Universe and the S8 Tension

Current cosmological discoveries emphasize how crucial the universe's clumpiness is to comprehending its composition and development. The Cosmic Microwave Background (CMB), which shows minute density fluctuations that resulted in galaxy formation, provides a trace of the universe's early history, beginning with the Big Bang around 13.8 billion years ago. The commonly accepted Lambda Cold Dark Matter (ACDM) model proposes that 95% of the universe is made up of dark matter and dark energy, which have an impact on how large-scale structures form. Matter clustering across 26 million light-years is measured by a crucial parameter called Sigma 8 (S8), but inconsistent measurements have resulted in the S8 tension, which calls into question the precision of ACDM.

6. Biiu Patnaik Honoured by Russia on Victory Day Russia honored the former chief minister of Odisha, Biju Patnaik, on the 80th anniversary of Victory Day for his service during World War II, particularly in the Battle of Stalingrad. The Russian embassy in New Delhi sent an invitation to his son, Naveen Patnaik, to attend a special reception. After completing his training at the Delhi Flying Club, Biju joined the Royal Indian Air Force in 1936 and braved Nazi threats to fly crucial supply missions to support Soviet troops in Stalingrad.



7.Delhi Government Announces Rooftop Solar Panel Subsidy Scheme

The Delhi government has launched a new subsidy effort to encourage rooftop solar panel installations, with the goal of increasing clean and affordable energy access for families across the capital. As part of this effort, the government plans to install solar panels in 2,30,000 households over the next three years. 1: Each residence is entitled for a total subsidy of Rs 1,08,000 for a 3-kW system, which comprises Rs 78,000 from the national government and Rs 30,000 from the Delhi government. This project, which falls under the Free Electricity Scheme, replaces the previous variable subsidy with a fixed amount of Rs 10,000 per kW.

8.The first detection of West Nile Virus in UK mosquitoes raises concerns about climate change.

In July 2023, the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) reported the first finding of West Nile virus (WNV) in Aedes vexans mosquitos collected from wetlands near the River Idle in Nottinghamshire, indicating that mosquito-borne diseases may spread to new areas as a result of climate change. WNV, a single-stranded RNA virus from the Flavivirus genus, is typically spread by birds and mosquitos, with humans and horses serving as incidental hosts.

9.The Vice President urges the Supreme Court to revisit its 1991 decision on judicial accountability.

Vice President Jagdeep Dhankar has requested that the Supreme Court's decision from 1991 be reconsidered. K. Veeraswami case, citing its implications for judicial accountability in the face of concerns about corruption in the higher courts. Former Madras High Court Chief Justice K. Veeraswami was prosecuted by the CBI of owning disproportionate assets under the Prevention of Corruption Act in 1976. After his petition to quash proceedings was dismissed by the Madras High Court in 1979, the issue reached the Supreme Court, which determined that judges are public officials under the Act and can be prosecuted with the President's approval, provided the Chief Justice of India is consulted.

10. Global Health Bodies

Urged to Address Sleep Deprivation as Key Factor in Noncommunicable Diseases.

The World Health Organization (WHO) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) are focusing more attention on noncommunicable diseases (NCDs), which account for over 74% of premature global deaths, particularly in low- and middle-income countries. Obehypertension, diabetes, sity, heart disease, stroke, chronic lung illnesses, and cancer are among the most common noncommunicative disorders. Sleep disturbances, which are frequently ignored, play an important role in NCDs by exacerbating diseases such as obesity and cardiovascular disease. The ideal adult sleep duration is 7 to 8 hours, however modern lifestyles limit sleep, harming both physical and mental health.


