DR. S KANAGARAJ PARTICIPATED IN ICSSR SPONSORED FDP AT GOA

The Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR) sponsored a 12-Day Capacity Building Programme on Research Methodology for young faculty in the social sciences, held from 8th to 19th September 2025 was attended by our Vice Chairperson Dr.S.Kanagaraj. Organized by IGNOU Regional Centre, Panaji, in collaboration with the Goa State Research Foundation, the programme selected 30 participants out of nearly 600 applicants. The inaugural session, addressed by Shri Prasad Lolayekar, IAS, emphasized interdisciplinary approaches and the importance of research that contributes meaningfully to academia and society. The objective of the



programme was to strengthen participants' ability to identify research problems, design methodologies, and publish quality studies.

Across thirty-six sessions, the FDP covered fundamentals of research, literature review, formulation of objectives and hypotheses, and ethical practices. Practical modules included interviews, observation methods, survey techniques, and sampling strategies, ensuring participants gained a strong grounding in both qualitative and quantitative methods. Sessions on data analysis, led by experts, introduced hands-on training with statistical software like R and techniques for thematic coding. Additional components addressed bibliometric tools, AI-enabled manuscript preparation, e-resources, and academic writing. The inclusion of Indian Knowledge System (IKS) sessions enriched perspectives by blending traditional wisdom with contemporary research practices.

The programme also featured workshops on proposal writing, peer review of participant papers, and stress management, offering holistic capacity building. A field visit to cultural and research sites in Goa provided real-world exposure. The valedictory session, led by Shri Bhushan K. Savaikar, urged participants to transform their learnings into impactful



research and collaborations. Overall, the FDP provided methodological clarity, digital competence, ethical orientation, and professional confidence, fostering a sustainable culture of research among faculty.



The drive not only made public areas cleaner but also reminded everyone of the importance of working together for a cleaner and greener future.







She lost family members in a bombing. His two spouses develop a close relationship with one another. Marium killed Rasheed to keep Laila safe when his aggression became unbearable. She consents to her execution, which lets Laila and her kids flee from him. She then gets back together with Tariq, her genuine love. The plot of the work is highly predictable. Sonam Kapoor's act of Neerja seems sincere and true. She brings out both Neerja's fragility and her exceptional inner resilience. Shabana Azmi's portrayal as Neerja's mother brings out poignancy through her emotive act such that one of the movie's best things remains that mother-daughter relationship. Why Neerja is so effective is that it finds a balance between heroism and humanity. The sequences covering the hijacking are intense, yet they never forget Neerja's humanity. Even amidst situations that would otherwise be most frightening for anyone else, Neerja chooses other peoples' lives over hers. The movie never uses undue drama or overwrought action; it simply allows the real-life incident to talk.

THE INCOME TAX (NO.2) BILL, 2025

On August 11, 2025, the Income-Tax (No. 2) Bill, 2025, was introduced in the Lok Sabha. It's a big change because it's replacing the Income-Tax Act, 1961. This Bill replaces the earlier Income-Tax Bill, 2025, which was introduced in February. That bill was referred to a Select Committee headed by Mr. Baijayant Panda, but it was later withdrawn. The new Bill considers the Committee's recommendations and is set to come into force on April 1, 2026. The new Bill mostly keeps the same rules as the 1961 Act. That way, India's tax system stays the same. Tax laws for individuals and companies remain unchanged, along with their definitions, offenses, penalties, and administrative structures. The primary objective of this Bill is to simplify tax understanding, eliminate outdated rules, and modernize the tax system without altering any crucial aspects.

Core Objectives

- > Simplification: Replace archaic language and redundant provisions with clear, concise, and modern legal text.
- ➤ **Digital Integration**: Enable faceless assessments and digital compliance to reduce human interface and corruption.
- > Taxpayer-Centric Approach: Improve ease of filing, reduce litigation, and enhance transparency.
- ➤ Global Alignment: Reflect contemporary economic realities, including taxation of digital assets and global income.

A significant shift involves the central government gaining greater authority to establish new rules for online processes. Previously, specific rules governed inquiries, valuations, and recovery. However, now, all these aspects are encompassed under a single umbrella power. This means the government can design schemes to make things more efficient, transparent, and accountable. Another important change is in how tax enforcement works. Authorities can now search and seize things in the digital world, like email servers, social media accounts, online investment and trading platforms, and websites that show who owns assets. They can even override access codes if they need to. In international tax cases, the Bill makes it clear that if a term in a tax treaty is not defined in the treaty or the Act, or in central government notifications, the meaning of that term can be found in any other central law. Overall, the Bill wants to make India's tax laws simpler, adapt them to the digital age, and make them more transparent, all while keeping the existing tax rules in place.

STATE SCHEME

EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE TO CHILDREN OF PRISONERS (PURSUING PROFESSIONAL COURSE)



The Department of Social Justice, Government of Kerala, has launched a special scheme to help children of prisoners continue their higher education. When a parent is sent to prison, the children often face social, emotional, and financial struggles. Education is one of the areas most affected. To reduce this hardship and give such students a chance to pursue professional courses, the government started this scheme in 2014.

Financial Support

Each eligible student is granted financial aid of ₹1,00,000. This amount covers both tuition fees and hostel charges. More than one child from the same

family can also receive the benefit, ensuring that no student is left behind due to family circumstances.

Eligibility Criteria

The student must be a native and resident of Kerala.

The family should come under the Below Poverty Line (BPL) category.

The applicant should be the child of a prisoner sentenced to life imprisonment or death.

Admission to the professional course must be through merit quota.

The student must have secured 70% or above in Higher Secondary.

Course Details

The support is available for degree-level professional courses in government and aided colleges within Kerala. For professional studies like MBBS or BVSc., financial assistance is given only if the student is admitted to a government college.

Special Conditions

If both parents are imprisoned and the child is taken care of by relatives from an Above Poverty Line (APL) family, the application will be considered based on the Probation Officer's inquiry report. If there are many applicants, priority is given to students with higher marks.

This initiative is a strong step by the Kerala Government to ensure that children of prisoners are not deprived of opportunities in education. By extending financial support, the scheme helps them move forward with confidence and hope for a better future.

CENTRAL SCHEME

NATIONAL SCHEME OF INCENTIVE TO GIRLS FOR SECONDARY EDUCATION

Details

It promotes the girl child's enrolment of 14-18 years age group at secondary stage, who passes class 8th and subsequently drops out for various socio-economic reasons. The proposed scheme is further intended to retain such girl children up to class 12th. In the year 2004-05, the dropout rate of girls from classes 1st to 8th was about 50.8%. For classes 1st to 10th the dropout rate of girls was about 64% in the same year. Hence, only 36% of the country's girl students could be retained up to class 10th. This is



the combined result of several socio-economic factors, but a major contributor is no doubt the inability of the parents to afford the cost of education of the girl child.

Benefits

A sum of ₹3000/- would be deposited under fixed deposit in a public sector bank or in a post office in the name of every eligible girl child. The period of the deposit may be counted from the date of deposit to the date on which the girl child attains the age of 18 years. No premature withdrawal will be allowed.

Eligibility

- 1. The applicant should be a girl child.
- 2. The applicant should be from Scheduled Caste / Scheduled Tribe (SC/ST)
- 3. The applicant should have passed class 8th from Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidhyalayas (irrespective of whether they belong to Scheduled Castes or Tribes)
- 4. The applicant should have enrolled for class 9th in State/UT Government

Exclusions

- 1. Married girls will be excluded from the scheme.
- 2. Girl children studying in private unaided schools are proposed to be excluded since a majority of such schools charge high fees and therefore, parents of such girl students may not require the financial assistance that is being offered under this scheme.
- 3. Students enrolled in schools run by Central Government are also being excluded from the scheme, as these children are either fully provided for already, or are those of Central Government employees, who can afford the education of their children, without further support.





1. New Discoveries in Western Ghats Lizard Diversity

From the recent biodiversity surveys, scientists found a rare and endemic lizard species. For the first time, they saw Beddome's cat skink in Aralam and Kottiyoor Wildlife Sanctuaries. They also found the very rare Kottiyoor Day Gecko again, which people hadn't seen for many years. These discoveries show the rich reptilian diversity and emphasise the importance of ongoing conservation efforts in fragile ecosystem.



2. Unmesha Festival

The 3rd Unmesha International Literature Festival happened in Patna, Bihar from 25–28 September 2025. Writers, poets, and publishers from 15 countries and 100+ languages joined in. The Vice-President of India, C.P. Radhakrishnan, came as the Chief Guest for the closing ceremony, which was also his first visit to

Bihar after becoming VP. The festival focused on how literature helps society and brings cultures together. The festival promotes literary diversity by bringing together voices from across the globe. It serves as a platform to bridge divides of language, culture, and ideology.

3.NASA-ISRO NISAR Satellite Sends First Earth Images

The NASA-ISRO NISAR satellite just recently transmitted its inaugural images of Earth surface It's a big step before it starts full science work in 2025. The data promises to enhance disaster response, infrastructure monitoring, and agricultural management worldwide. The images reveal detailed land use patterns such as


Wetlands, agricultural fields, and irrigation methods. This precision enables accurate monitoring of ecosystems and human activities on the ground.



4. Child Marriage Declines Sharply in India by 2025

A new report shows child marriage in India has gone way down — 69% less for girls and

72% less for boys! This happened thanks to efforts by the government, states, and groups working together. The report was shared at the UN in New York, and it's a big step toward ending child marriage in India.



5.India's Export Economy Faces Deep Regional Imbalances

In 2025, India's exports are still mostly coming from just a few states. When the US slapped a 25% tariff on Indian goods, it not only showed the tension between the two countries but also highlighted big gaps within India's own economy. Some regions are hit harder than others, showing how uneven and fragile the growth really is.

6. Ladakh Protests Demand Sixth Schedule and Statehood Ladakh saw major protests in Sept 2025, where things turned violent — a BJP office in Leh was burned, police used teargas, and sadly 4 people died with about 30 injured. The Leh Apex Body called for a shutdown, and climate activist Sonam Wangchuk ended his 15-day hunger strike, asking people to stay peaceful. The unrest is mainly about Ladakh's push for more autonomy and constitutional rights.



7.China's New K Visa Challenges US H-1B Tech Talent

In 2025, China launched a new K visa to pull in young talent in science and tech. This comes as the US makes it harder to get H-1B visas, which used to be the main way for foreign workers to join American tech companies. China's move could shake up the global race for innovation and research. The visa offers more flexible entry, longer validity, and broader activity scopes than existing Chinese visas.



8.Election Commission Launches Aadhaar-Based E-Sign Verification

The Election Commission of India

(ECI) introduced a new e-sign feature on its ECINET portal and app in September 2025. This feature mandates identity verification through Aadhaar-linked phone numbers for voter registration, deletion, and correction requests. This move aims to enhance the security and authenticity of electoral roll management. Applicants seeking to add, delete, or correct voter details must now verify their identity using the Aadhaar number linked to their phone.




9. India Tests Agni-Prime Missile From Rail Launcher

India just pulled off a big defense milestone — it test-launched the Agni-Prime missile from a rail-based mobile launcher for the first time. This shows how much India is leveling up its strategic power and deterrence game. This innovation enables the missile to move across the country without restrictions. It offers cross-country mobility, faster reaction time, and reduced visibility, enhancing strategic flexibility and survivability.



10.India's Roadmap to Fusion Power and SST-Bharat Reactor

India is stepping up in nuclear fusion research with its SST-Bharat project — a fusion-fission hybrid reactor. It's planned to make 130 MW of power (100 from fission + 30 from fusion) and give 5x the input energy. By 2060, they aim to build a full demo reactor producing 250 MW with 20x efficiency. Super ambitious but a big deal for future clean energy.

I find it difficult to root my inspiration in just one person, because it has been shaped by the small gestures, values, and mannerisms of many individuals I've encountered along the way.
