

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

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

Live Webinar on Role of Youth in Protecting the Rights of Girl Child








Invited talk by the faculty Dr.S.Kanagaraj in Unnat Bharat Abhiyan 2.0



A glance into Starry night, Van Gogh and his mental health

he Starry night is a world-renowned painting with its swirling brush strokes with shades of blue and yellow. Even to this day it is used as a design in T-shirts, bags, mugs, wallpaper or even tiles around the world. Sometimes it's author who is categorised as an insane genius is almost always forgotten, who is Vincent Van Gogh. This article discusses his mental illness and how painting helped him through his painful mental illness journey. Art and mental health can be linked in a good way-artistic pursuits like sculpting, painting, and sketching have been shown to reduce stress and enhance mental serenity. It gives a calming diversion by taking your attention away from your daily routine. When you're doing art, your brain goes through a process of flow, and your anxieties go away as you concentrate on the details of your art. Present day doctors noted that individuals living with mental illness often expressed themselves in drawings and other art works, which led many to explore the use of art as a healing strategy.

Numerous mental disorders have been diagnosed posthumously in this artist. He couldn't avail support and medications as of today for such mental health disorder in the 1890s. Throughout his life he produced over 2000 art works, over 800 of them were oil paintings. Art was his greatest love, the thing that always excited him. During a period in hospital he had been denied his painting tools, this affected his mental state and behaviour. In the end doctors realized that to survive, Vincent must have the chance to paint and create. In his time in the Saint-Paul-de-Mausole-



um asylum near Saint-Rémy-de-Provence in 1889, Vincent van Gogh painted Starry Night. It depicts Van Gogh's view from the mental asylum. He had a good time at the hospital and was given more freedom than the other patients. He was allowed to leave the hospital grounds if he was accompanied, and he was allowed to paint, read, and retire into his own chamber. He was even granted his own studio space. While he experienced the occasional relapse into paranoia and fits - he had been formally diagnosed with epileptic fits - his mental health looked to be improving.avoided his tragic fate, and grown further as an artist.

Unfortunately, he relapsed. He began to suffer hallucination and have thoughts of suicide as he plunged into depression. Accordingly, there was a tonal shift in his work. He returned to incorporating the darker colours from the beginning of his career and Starry Night is an example of that shift. Blue dominates the painting, blending hills into the sky. The little village lays at the base in the painting in browns, greys, and blues. Even though each building is clearly outlined in black, the yellow and white of the stars and the moon stand out against the sky, drawing the eyes to the sky. Plagued by psychiatric illness throughout his life, van Gogh committed suicide in 1890. Evidence suggests that he had manic depression, a chronic mental illness thought affects many creative people. Although treatment with lithium carbonate is now

available, the drug also dampens creative abilities. Many people believe that artists overcome suffering with their creative acts, but suffering may also overwhelm the artist. Had lithium carbonate therapy been available, van Gogh might have defeated his manic depression, avoided his tragic fate, and grown further as an artist.

"If I could have worked without this accursed disease, what things I might have done," he wrote in one of his last letters.

STORY REVIEW

Pali: A Short Story by Bhisham Sahni

Bhisham Sahni was a prolific translator and author of fiction and plays. His novel Tamas (Darkness), translated into English in 1988, received international notice for its portrayal of the communal riots during Partition. Sahni's short story Pali can also be termed as a partition text as it exposes the violence and bloodshed of the dark era of partition.

Pali is the symbol of innocence explicated through the image of a child who gets lost from his parents as a part of the chaos that happened during the partition. Sahni paints a brilliant portrait of the struggles of the common men who had to suffer as a part of the dubious plan of the British. Sahni, through the central character, looks at the idea of how the notion of identity is fluid in nature. When Pali was with his biological parents, he grew up as a Hindu boy and in the care of Shakur and Zehnab whom he calls Abbaji and Ammi respectively, he could grow up as a Muslim. In both contexts, Pali remained innocent, unaware of the politics of religion. Pali represented humanity that cried for peace and harmony but the confused state of Pali himself was a metaphor for the confusion of humanity as a whole during the time of partition.



It is also interesting to bring into focus the character of the social worker from the Indian side in the text. A social worker is a person who should be able to understand the condition of a child, its emotions, state of mind and to adopt the best intervention possible to deal with the trauma of the child. The social worker in the text is presented as a biased woman who is also a fundamentalist. When she throws out the cap given by Shakur and Zehnab to Pali, it becomes more obvious that she is a misfit to the profession.

Harriet Rinaldo

JANUARY

Harriet Rinaldo (1906 - 1980) was an American social worker best known for creating the personnel standards, rating procedures and recruitment procedures for the Veterans Administration Social Work Service. She was also the first person to identify clinical social work as a separate branch with its own specifications.

Rinaldo was born in Sioux City, Iowa in 1906. She attended Smith College from 1923. After graduating with honours in 1927, she continued at the Smith and received a master's degree in Social Science in 1929.

She wrote a thesis titled "The altering of family attitudes toward the child with prolonged illness as a causative factor of behaviour problems : A study of fifty cases selected at the Institute for Child Guidance, New York City, from Child Guidance Clinic Records to weigh the importance as factors influencing behaviour problems of prolonged illness on a child as compared to the effect of the illness in altering parental and siblings attitudes." After taking up a degree in social work, she worked at the Children's Aid Society and then, the county welfare agency in Philadelphia. She then moved to New York in 1946 to work for the Social Security Agency. In 1946, she moved to Washington, DC to join the Veterans Administration. She worked there until her retirement in 1972.

During her tenure at the Veterans Administration, Rinaldo recruited social workers to support the expansion of post World War II Veteran Administration Medical Services. She helped establish job standards and definitions which would later influence the Civil Service requirements for other federal agencies, as well as for the state and local health care programs.

Rinaldo also served on various committees of social work such as the National Association of Social Workers, the Committee on the Study of Competence, the Academy of Certified Social Workers, American Public Welfare Association and the Council on Social Work Education.

The Whistleblowers Protection Act, 2014

Whistleblowing is defined as an act of disclosing information by an employee or any concerned stakeholder about an illegal or unethical conduct within an organisation. A whistleblower is a person who informs about a person or organisation engaged in such illicit activity.

Informers who reveal inside information have existed throughout history. As Lykourgos, the Athenian orator, puts it – neither laws nor judges can bring any result, unless someone denounces the wrongdoers. Even Kautilya, in his Arthashastra, acknowledged the concept of whistleblowing and proposed a reward for such whistleblowers.

There have been multiple instances of threatening, harassment, and even murder of various whistleblowers. More than 15 whistleblowers have been murdered in India in the past three years and around 65 people have been killed for exposing corruption on the basis of information they obtained under the Right to Information Act.

The Whistleblowers Protection Bill was proposed in 2011 and was finally passed in 2014. It seeks to establish a mechanism to receive complaints related to disclosure of allegations of corruption or wilful misuse of power or discretion, against any public servant, and to inquire or cause an inquiry into such disclosure. The act also provides adequate safeguards against victimisation of the person making such complaints. Any public servant or any other person may make a public interest disclosure before a competent authority. It does not allow anonymous complaints to be made and clearly states that no action will be taken if the complainant does not establish their identity. The act is not applicable to the personnel and officers of Special Protection Groups.

The act was amended in 2015 which prohibited a disclosure if it contains any information that has been classified under the Official Secrets Act of 1923 even if it aims to disclose acts of corruption, misuse of power, or criminal activities. This dilutes the very existence of the Whistleblowers Protection Act of 2014.

Whistleblowers have brought accountability and transparency to government functioning by revealing information about various scams. They need to be provided protection so that they can function without being scared about their lives. Our various European counterparts such as Sweden have a very strong legal framework to protect the identity of the whistleblower. India should also adopt such measures to ensure an increase in transparency and accountability.

SCHEMES

CBSE Udaan Scheme

Udaan is a project started by the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) under the guidance of the Ministry of Education (formerly Ministry of Human Resource Development) with the aim to increase the enrolment rate of girls in engineering colleges. It is designed to provide deserving girl students of standard 11th with free offline/online study resources to prepare for engineering entrance examinations and secure admission into the elite engineering colleges of India.

Listed below is the eligibility criteria of CBSE Udaan:

- Only Indian residents can apply for the Udaan program by CBSE.
- The girl candidate must be studying in class 11 from any Kendriya Vidyalaya/ Navodaya/ Government schools recognised by any Board or CBSE affiliated private schools in India.
- The candidate must be pursuing Science stream with subjects of Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics (PCM).
- The applicant must have secured an average of at least 70% marks in class 10. She must have scored a minimum of 80% marks in Science and Mathematics. For students who are enrolled in those schools which follow CGPA, a minimum CGPA score of 8 and a GPA of 9 in Science and Mathematics is needed.
- The candidates belonging to SC, ST, OBC and PWD category get a reservation of 15%, 7.5%, 27% and 3% seats, respectively.
- Also, the annual family income of the applicant must not be more than INR 6 Lakhs.
- Listed below are the benefits that are being provided under this scheme:
- The candidates are provided with free study materials through online/offline mode. They receive tutorials, videos and study resources.
- Udaan organises virtual contact classes at around 60 designated city centres.
- Students are also given remedial steps to correct their learning.
- Motivational sessions are provided to students and their parents.
- Udaan has also started 'Student Helpline' services to clarify students' doubts, monitor their learning and provide them with technological support.
- Candidates also get constant monitoring and tracking of their progress with feedback.

Anundoram Borooah Laptop Award Scheme (ARBAS)

The Government of Assam launched the Anundoram Borooah Laptop Award Scheme (ARBAS) in the year 2005. This scheme is an award scheme for encouraging competitive spirit amongst the students studying in Assam. The Government of Assam provides lap-loods tops as awards to the students who have obtained excellent results in the class 10 examination. The award under the ARBAS scheme is given in honour of Late Anundoram Borooah, the 4th Indian and the 1st Assamese to join the Indian Civil Service (ICS). He was the first Indian Civilian to be appointed as District Magistrate. The ARBAS scheme aims to enhance 16 healthy competition among the students studying in the 10th class. It also helps the students enrich their perception with information and up-to-date knowledge through IT education.

- Every year the Secondary Education Board of Assam (SEBA) conducts the High School Leaving Certificate (HSLC) and Assam High Madrassa (AHM) examinations for students who are studying in standard 10th in Assam. The students who secure first division marks in the HSLC and AHM examinations conducted by the SEBA are eligible to receive the award under this scheme. Under the ARBAS scheme, the eligible students will receive the following benefits:
- Laptop
- SIM card
- Wi-Fi device
- Online education material of class XI and XII for the students
- Excellence training for the students of the Science stream

CURRENT AFFAIRS

1. India votes in favour of UNSC resolution to renew mandate of Counter-Terrorism Committee Executive Directorate (CTED) -

India, which will chair the UN Security Council's Counter-Terrorism Committee (CTC), has voted in favour of a resolution to renew the mandate of the CTC Executive Directorate, as it asked nations to remain united against the "tendency of labelling terror acts based on its motivation". The UN Security Council, through its written silence procedure, renewed the mandate of the Counter-Terrorism Committee Executive Directorate (CTED) until December 31, 2025.

2. 'Padhe Bharat' launched by the Department of School Education and Literacy –

Padhe Bharat is in alignment with the National Education Policy 2020, which emphasises on promotion of joyful reading culture for children by ensuring availability of age-appropriate reading books for children in local/mother tongue/regional/tribal Language. It will focus on children studying in Balvatika to Grade 8. This campaign has also been aligned with the vision and goals of the Foundational Literacy and Numeracy Mission.

3. The Ministry of Education launches NEAT 3.0 to provide best developed ed-tech solutions -

National Educational Alliance for Technology (NEAT) is an initiative to provide the use of best-developed technological solutions in the education sector to enhance the employability of the youth on a single platform for learners' convenience. These solutions use artificial intelligence for a personalised and customised learning experience for better learning outcomes and skill development in the niche areas. Union Education Minister and Skill Development Minister Dharmendra Pradhan on Monday launched NEAT 3.0, a single platform to provide the best-developed ed-tech solutions and courses to students of the country.

4. UNSC states pledge to avoid nuclear war -

Five of the world's nuclear powers on Monday pledged to prevent the proliferation of nuclear arms and have also said that nuclear war is not an option. China, France, Russia, the UK and the US have agreed that a nuclear war "cannot be won and must never be fought." The pledge was made in a rare joint statement ahead of a review of the Non-Proliferation Treaty, 1970.

5. Cabinet approves second phase of Green Energy Corridor (GEC) for intra-state transmission system -It will facilitate grid integration and power evacuation of approximately 20 GW of Renewable Energy (RE) power projects in seven States namely, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu and Uttar Pradesh. It aims at synchronising the electricity produced from renewable resources, such as wind and solar, with the conventional power stations in the grid. It aims to achieve the target of 450 GW installed RE capacity by 2030.

6. Marital rape in India -

Recently, a batch of petitions seeking criminalization of marital rape, has been filled in the Delhi High Court. The petition seeks to amend the criminal law, which includes Section 375 (rape) of the Indian Penal Code. Marital rape (or spousal rape) is an act in which one of the spouses indulges in sexual intercourse without the consent of the other. In India, marital rape is not defined in any statute or law. The only recourse against non-consensual sex for married women are civil provisions under the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act on cruelty against a wife by the husband or a husband's relatives. Criminalizing marital rape will ensure that women remain safer from abusive spouses and they can receive the help needed to recover from marital rape and can save themselves from domestic violence and sexual abuse.

The Global Risks Report series tracks global risks perceptions among risk experts and world leaders in business, government, and civil society. It examines risks across five categories: Economic, Environmental, Geopolitical, Societal, and Technological. 'Social cohesion erosion', 'livelihood crises', and 'mental health deterioration' are three of the five risks seen as the most concerning threats to the world in the next two years. Environmental risks appear as top risks in the short-, medium-and long-term outlooks. In the medium term, economic risks such as 'debt crises' and 'asset bubble burst' also emerge as governments struggle to balance fiscal priorities. In the longer-term horizon, geopolitical and technological risks are of concern tooincluding 'geo-economic confrontations', 'geopolitical resource contestation' and 'cybersecurity failure'.

8. Indian Meteorological Department launches first Climate Hazards and Vulnerability Atlas of India -

The Climate Hazards and Vulnerability Atlas of India, developed by the scientists at Climate Research and Services (CRS) office of the India Meteorological Department (IMD), Pune, was launched by Dr Jitendra Singh. The atlas features extreme rainfall, drought, coldwave, heatwave, dust storms, hail storm, thunderstorm, cyclones, snowfall, lightning, winds and fog. The hazards and vulnerability values have been calculated utilising the MET department's historical climate data. Each weather phenomenon's month-wise hazard levels posed to the respective district has been enlisted in this one-of-its-kind atlas. The atlas provides a range of vulnerability with risks ranging from nil, low, moderate, high and very high categories for every Indian district.

9. Supreme Court uploads 27% OBC quota in NEET

The bench of Justices DY Chandrachud and A S Bopanna upheld the Constitutional validity of reservation for Other Backward Classes (OBCs) in the All India Quota for National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (NEET) for undergraduate and postgraduate medical admissions stating that competitive exams do not reflect the economic social advantage accrued to some classes over a period of time and that merit should be socially contextualised.

10. 73rd Republic Day -

Republic day is a monumental day in Indian history because it was on this day that India adopted its own Constitution and declared its own laws of the land. It is celebrated every year on 26th January to commemorate the adoption of the Indian Constitution, which came into effect on this day in 1950. India celebrated its 73rd Republic Day this year with the iconic parade at New Delhi's Rajpath showcasing its military prowess and cultural pageantry. A flypast by 75 aircraft and helicopters was the highlight of this year's parade. This year's celebrations are significant - it's the 75th anniversary of India's Independence, being observed as 'Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsay' across the country. President Ram Nath Kovind approved awards of 384 gallantry and other defence decorations to armed forces personnel and others. With the parade taking place under the shadow of the coronavirus pandemic yet again, strict guidelines were imposed for those attending.
