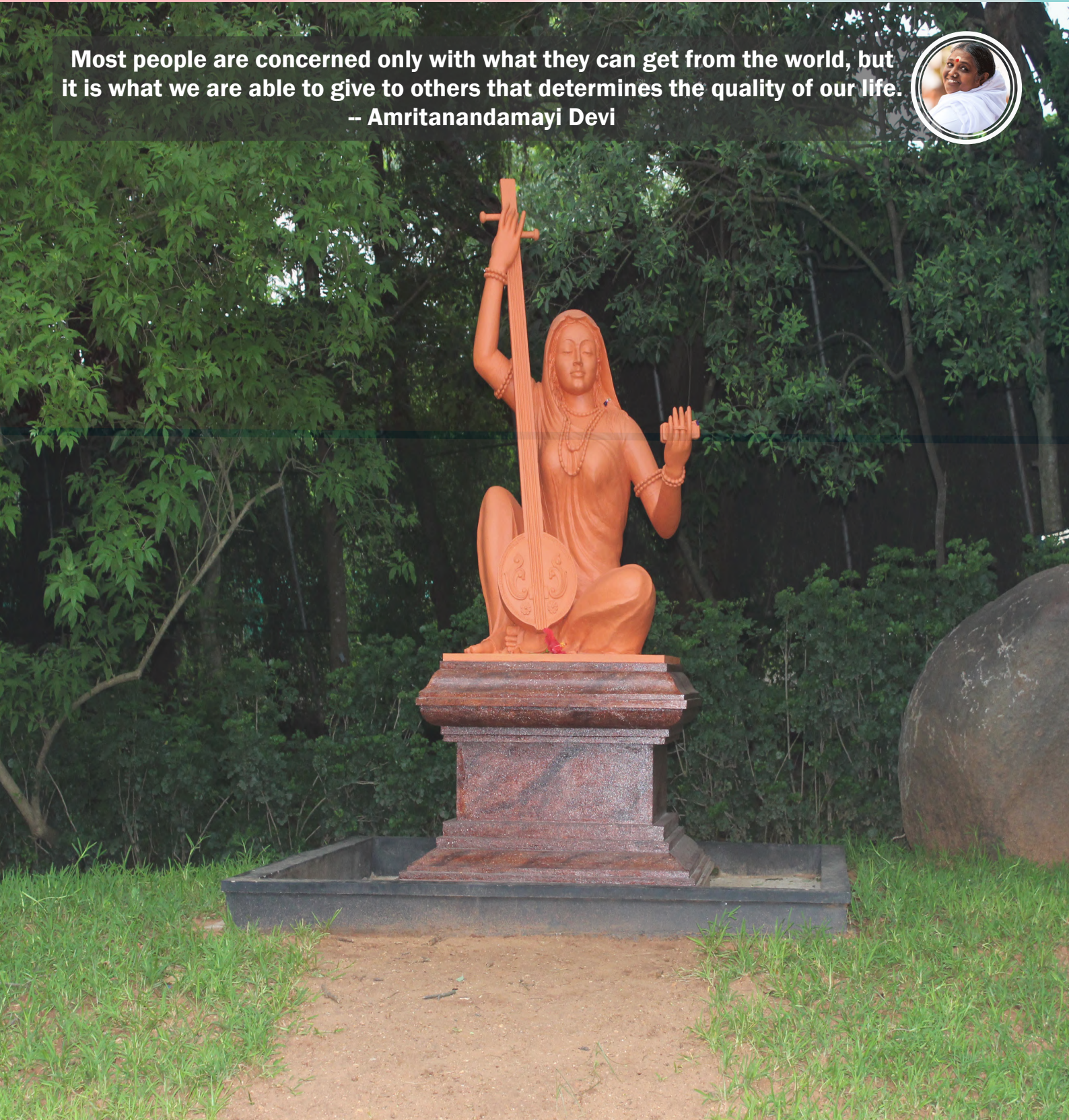

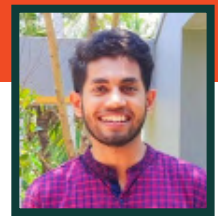

All faculty members from Department of Social Work, Coimbatore campus participated in Faculty Development Programme (FDP) to develop the skills to conduct high quality research studies to publish in high-tier scientific journals from 4th to 9th July 2022.

Overall FDP objectives:

To promote the skills to conduct high-quality scientific research studies

To promote the know-how of how to publish one's findings in a high-tier Scopus-indexed scientific journal



Day 1: 04.07.2022

FDP started with the lighting of the lamp by Br. Vishwanathamrita Chaitanya and joined by Dr. Jyothi, Dr. Jyothi S. N., Associate Dean, School of Engineering, Amritapuri and Dr. Narayanankutty Karuppath Principal, School of Physical Sciences, Amritapuri | Principal, School of Arts, Humanities, & Commerce, Amritapuri. Dr. Sophia von Lieres (Germany), Professor, Department of Social Work, Amritapuri campus welcomed and gave an introduction about the six days research methods of FDP.

Session on Scientific Method: inductive and deductive logic by Dr. Sophia von Lieres. The session covered understanding the scientific method and inductive and deductive logic. There was a practice session: Using induction to develop theories and deduction to test theories.

Day 2: 05.07.2022

Session on Research problem and its importance was handled by Dr. Malini Frey, Faculty, Dept of Social Work, Amritapuri Campus. The session covered How to develop a good research question?. 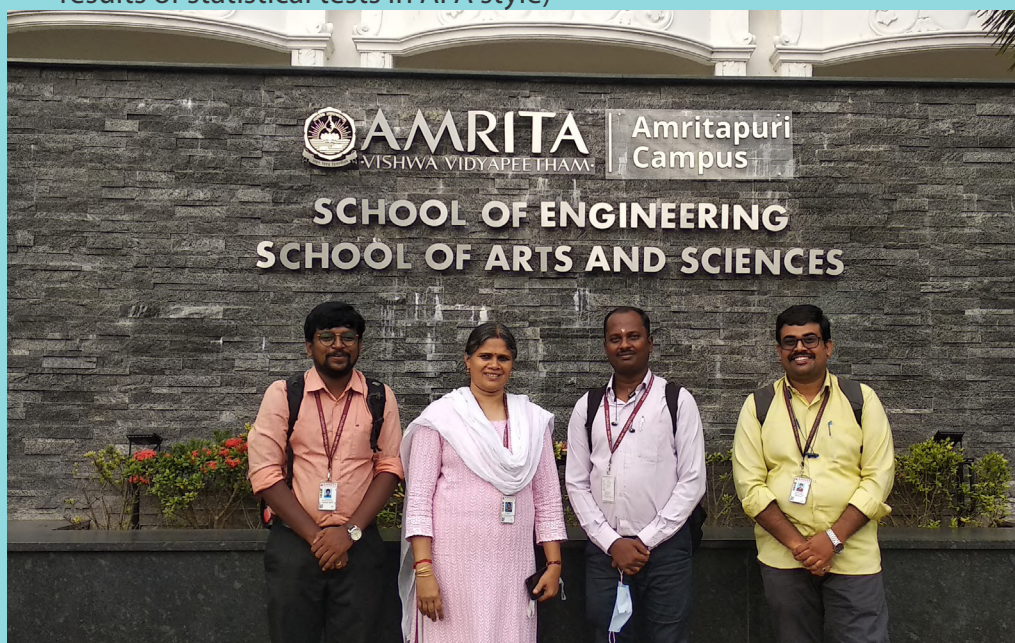
Day 6: 09.07.2022

WELL KNOWN SOCIAL WORKER

Mayilamma- The Plachimada Heroine

Mayilamma was an Indian social activist whose claim to fame was the campaign against Coca-Cola Company in Plachimada in Palakkad, Kerala. She belonged to a native tribal community. She was the recipient of the Speak Out award by Outlook magazine and the Sthree Shakthi Award. She was born and brought up in the village Muthalamada, on the border of Palakkad. When she turned 15 years old, her father Raman and mother Kurumanda married her off to Mari Muthu from Plachimada. She came to live with him in Plachimada after her wedding.

Mayilamma was directly affected by Coca-Cola's operations in Plachimada. In 1998, the Coca-Cola company acquired the permit to set up a bottling plant in Plachimada, a relatively dry village on the Tamil Nadu-Kerala border, which was near the highway. The water in her well (in Vijaynagar colony in Plachimada) had been so heavily polluted by Coca-Cola's operations that it has been deemed unfit for human consumption.

Elected politicians promised the residents that the presence of the company would usher in job opportunities. When the factory began to operate in 2000, however, the only jobs available to them was that of cleaning bottles. The factory extracted 1.5-2 million litres of water from the ground every day. Its dumping leached into the soil, destroying its fertility. The company brought in tankers of water, albeit from questionable sources, to meet the water requirements of the colony, but this was no permanent solu-



tion. The degree of pollution and extraction was exorbitant. The Adivasis decided to protest against the company, demanding an end to its operations in the area and monetary compensation for the sufferings they endured.

Six months after the factory began to operate, the quality of water in the wells had either depleted or considerably deteriorated. The water left the skin itchy, and the cooking inedible, leaving people tired and ill. Moreover, fields which once grew paddy were now left uncultivated, resulting in the loss of agricultural livelihoods.

Mayilamma played a key role in the campaign to hold Coca-Cola accountable for water shortages and pollution in the area. She joined the agitation after one year of its operation. She launched a Satyagraha against Coca-Cola on April 22, 2002. It was under her leadership that the community forced the Coca-Cola bottling plant to shut down in March 2004. The plant has remained shut down since. Mayilamma emerged as an unlikely leader. She felt deeply about nature, and lamented the destruction of the environment. She had a premonition of the ecological disaster much before it came into being. After having listened to speeches delivered by activists who came from outside in solidarity, Mayilamma learned to speak herself. The words came naturally to her.

She never joined a political party as she felt that political parties were detrimental to grassroots based development. The Anti-Coca Cola campaign in Plachimada may be seen as one among the trajectory of many grassroots ecological movements in the country and around the world. This campaign is not an issue of production, confined to Plachimada alone. Rather, it raises important ethical questions about consumption on a global scale.

SCHEMES & ACTS

The Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006.



This Act is to provide for the prohibition of solemnization of child marriages and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto. The Prohibition of Child Marriage Act was introduced in 2006 to address the weaknesses inherent in the former legislations. It came into effect from 1 November 2007, replacing the Child Marriage Restraint Act (CMRA) of 1929 or Sharda Act. This law was amended in 1978, wherein the legal age of marriage of girls was raised from 15 to 18 years and of boys from 18 to 21 years. The amended law was known as the Child Marriage Restraint Act, 1929. This Act consists of 21 sections. It extends all over India and renoncants (those who reject the local laws and accept French law) of the Union territory of Pondicherry. The government shall appoint Child marriage prohibition officers over the area specified in the official gazette. Their duties are:

- To prevent child marriage by taking action.
 - To collect evidence for effective prosecution.
 - To advise the locals not to indulge in promoting or helping or allowing solemnization of child marriage.
 - To create awareness of the evil of such child marriage
 - To sensitise the community on the issue
 - To furnish periodical returns and statistics when the government may direct
 - Such other duties assigned by the Government.
- To whom and where complaint can be made regarding child marriage:
- Call 1098, 1090 or 100
 - Complaint can be directly made to Child Marriage Prohibition Officer
 - The nearest police station
 - To District Magistrate

SCHEMES

SUKANYA SAMRIDDHI YOJANA



Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana is a small deposit scheme for girl children which would fetch an attractive interest rate and provide income tax rebate. The account can be opened in any post office or a public sector bank and on the date of account opening, the child's age should be less than 10 years. The scheme primarily ensures equitable share to a girl child in resources and savings of a family in which she is generally discriminated against a male child. The account may be opened with an initial deposit of Rs 250 and thereafter any amount in multiple of one hundred rupees may be deposited subject to the condition that a minimum of Rs. 250 shall be deposited in a financial year but the total money deposited in an account on a single occasion or on multiple

occasions shall not exceed Rs.1,50,000 in a financial year. Compulsory deposits need to be made until 14 years from the date of the opening of the account. No premature withdrawal is permitted, however, to meet the financial requirements for the purpose of higher education or marriage of the girl child, a maximum of 50% of the deposit amount can be withdrawn once she reaches the age of 18. The account shall mature on the completion of 21 years from the date of opening of the account or when the marriage of the girl child takes place, whichever happens earlier. On maturity, the balance including interest outstanding in the account shall be payable to the account holder on production of withdrawal slip along with the pass book.

KANYASHREE PRAKALPA – West Bengal

Kanyashree Prakalpa is an initiative taken by the government of West Bengal in order to improve the lives of girls who belong to the economically backward families. Its purpose is to curb child marriages and help girls to complete their formal education. It has been designed in such a manner that it ensures that the girls continue their education and delay their marriages at least till the age of eighteen. The scheme has two conditional cash benefit components (i) K1 – an annual scholarship of Rs. 1000/- to be paid annually to girls between the age group of 13 – 18 years of age for every year that they remain in school, provided that they are unmarried at the time, and (ii) K2 – a one time grant of Rs. 25000/-, to be paid when the girls turn 18, provided that they remain in the field of education and are unmarried at that time. As more and more girls remain in school, it is envisaged that they will use the opportunity to gain

skills and knowledge that will help them become economically independent. Even if girls do get married soon after they turn 18, it is expected that their education and enhanced social and emotional development will give them a better foundation for their adult lives. And over time, as entire generations of women enter marriages only after they have some degree of economic independence, it is expected that the practice of child marriage is completely eradicated, and women will attain their right to health, education and socio-economic equality.

- This scheme has been lauded by various national and international organisations including the United Nations.

CURRENT AFFAIRS



1. DRDO conducts successful maiden flight of Autonomous Flying Wing Technology

The Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) has conducted the maiden flight of the Autonomous Flying Wing Technology Demonstrator from the Aeronautical Test Range, Karnataka. It is powered by a small turbofan engine. The unmanned aerial vehicle is designed and developed by Aeronautical Development Establishment. The aircraft system such as airframe, undercarriage and entire flight control and avionics systems had been developed indigenously.

2. QS Best Student Cities Ranking 2023 released

London has emerged as the best city for students, according to the QS Best Student Cities Ranking 2023. Focus area of study: Affordable, student facilities, and university standard among other factors. Top four (2nd to 5th): Seoul, Munich, Zurich and Melbourne. India's highest-ranked student city is Mumbai at 103 spots, followed by Bengaluru at 114 ranks. Chennai and Delhi have made their entries to the list this year at 125 and 129, respectively.

3. Eknath Shinde sworn-in as the new Chief Minister of Maharashtra:

Governor, Bhagat Singh Koshyari has administered the oath of office to Eknath Shinde as the 20th Chief Minister of Maharashtra. BJP leader Devendra Fadnavis was sworn-in as Deputy Chief Minister of the state. Devendra Fadnavis had served as the CM of Maharashtra from



2014-19. Shinde has served as the urban development minister in the previous Mahavikas Aghadi government.

4. Jharkhand secures 1st rank in Delta Ranking for RURBAN Mission:

Jharkhand has been ranked first in the Delta Ranking for the month of June under the Shyama Prasad Mukherjee Rurban Mission. The report was released by the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India. The State Government led by CM Hemant Soren is moving forward with the mantra of "Jeevika Bhi, Jeevan Bhi".

Aim: To strengthen the rural economy and provide employment to the villagers. The state has earned 8th place in the country.

5. Geo-Portal for NCR made public 'PARIMAN' launched:

National Informatics Centre (NIC) has developed a web geo-portal for NCR, known as 'PARIMAN' for the purpose of effective utilisation of Remote Sensing and GIS technology. It will be initially used by NCR Participating states and the Office of National Capital Region Planning Board (NCRPB). It will help to improve decentralised planning and management in the NCR region.

6. Gita Gopinath becomes 1st woman to feature on wall of former chief economist:

Gita Gopinath has become the first woman and second Indian to feature on the 'wall of former chief economists' of the International Monetary Fund (IMF). Gopinath has served as IMF Chief Economist for three years, since October 2018. Raghuram Rajan, was the first Indian who was featured on the IMF's wall of former chief economists.





7. India will surpass China as world's most populous country during 2023: UN:

As per the 27th edition of the UN World Population Prospects 2022, India is projected to surpass China as the world's most populous country in 2023.

With a population of 1,426 million, China remains the most populous country in the world in 2022. India has a recorded 1,412 million population. The global population will reach 8 billion in November, 2022 that is three times of the population of 2.5 billion in 1950.

By 2050, India's population will reach 1,668 million.

8. WCD issues Guidelines for Mission Shakti Scheme:

The Ministry of Women and Child Development has issued detailed guidelines for 'Mission Shakti' scheme, will be applicable with effect from April 1st, 2022. Mission Shakti is an integrated women empowerment programme for the safety, security and empowerment of women for implementation during the 15th Finance Commission.

'Mission Shakti' has two sub-schemes: 'Sambal' and 'Samarthya'.

Sambal: Safety and security of women.

Samarthya: Empowerment of women.

9. Govt declares 'zero coupon zero principal

instruments' as securities:

The government has declared "zero coupon zero principal instruments" as securities.

Zero coupon zero principal instrument: An instrument issued by a Not-for-Profit Organisation, will be registered with the social stock exchange segment of a recognised stock exchange. These will be governed by rules made by the Securities and Exchange Board of India.

Social Stock Exchange: To serve private and non-profit sector providers by channelling greater capital to them.

10. Mirabai Chanu bagged first gold for India in 2022 Commonwealth Games:

Weightlifter Saikhom Mirabai Chanu has claimed first gold medal for India in the Women's 49Kg event at Birmingham 2022 CWG.

She lifted a total weight of 201Kg in snatch and clean and jerk category. Bindyarani Devi Sorokhaibam (Weightlifter) has bagged second Silver medal for India in Women's 55 Kg category.
