Uditi Jain - CB.SW.P2MSW21045





WELL KNOWN SOCIAL WORKER

Kriti Bharti

Kriti Bharti is a child marriage activist in India who has stood up against death threats to save victims of child marriages. Bharti made headlines as the first annuller of child marriage in India. She is the founder and director of Saarthi Trust, a non-profit organization that primarily rescues and ensures the recovery and welfare of child marriage victims. Bharti's team has annulled more than 41 child marriages and prevented more than 1,400 from occurring.

Kriti Bharti describes child marriage as a 'dark room' where children cannot see into their futures. Her organisation, the Saarthi Trust, is working to help children see the light. Kriti realised that annulling a marriage was not necessarily the end of the problem. Although some girls are welcomed back by their families, others are banished from their families or communities following annulment. To tackle this, Kriti set up a rehabilitation programme to enable the former child brides to flourish. Kriti's rehabilition programme is designed to ensure that the girls are equipped to lead successful, independent lives and to speak out against child marriage so that the cycle is broken for good. Many of the girls that have been rehabilitated have gone on to finish their education and pursue careers in medicine and engineering. Some have even continued working with Kriti to help rehabilitate other former child brides

By annulling child marriage and teaching former child brides and their families about other options, Kriti is changing social norms for the better. When community members and families see how much happier and prosperous girls are without child marriage they recognise their value to the community. Kriti calls this 'the chain of child marriage'. She knows she can't achieve this change alone so she is sharing her practices and ideas with civil society organisations and others throughout India. She has even been asked to deliver training to police and administration officers in Rajasthan and hopes that they will also now work to prevent and annul child marriages and help to rehabilitate child brides.

Kriti's unique activism is creating lasting change in many girl's lives in Rajasthan. However, she has faced criticism, resistance and even death threats, showing just how deeply entrenched the roots of child marriage are in Rajasthan. Despite these challenges, Kriti is continuing to reach as many girls as she can.



WELL KNOWN NGO

Chethana Integrated Development Society



Chethana Integrated Development Society is a non-governmental organisation located in the heart of Kayam-kulam town, in the district of Alappuzha, Kerala. It was established on the 20th of June, 2007. The organisation works mainly in villages in the districts of Alappuzha, Kollam and Pathanamthitta, across six regions: Chengannur, Kadampanad, Kattanam, Kollam, Mavelikara arid Puthoor. The areas covered comprise a heterogeneous population of Hindus, Christians and Muslims.

Chethana has been working for the overall development of the poor (especially the marginalised people in Kerala). The organisation facilitates self-help groups, empowers the poor, women, (especially the widows) handicapped, elderly, children and the marginalised. Various sections of the society are supported and empowered, irrespective of caste, creed and religion. The organisation has its own programs not to mention the fact that it is a centre for government projects as well. Both central level and state level projects are executed by the organisation. Government projects include DDU-GKY (Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana); the organisation

is a centre for the same, state government projects include Yuva Keralam. Other activities of the organisation include School Herbal Garden, Home Herbal Garden, Saphalam, Asha Kiranam, St. Peter's Hand (the latter three are programs run by the organisation to cater to different sectors of the society.)

One of the most prominent organisations in the district of Alappuzha, Chethana has been hailed for their wonderful and dedicated service to the society.



Schemes and Act

Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985

Drug abuse is a huge socio-economic problem in India and the government is taking several measures to reduce drug demand and promote rehabilitation of drug addicts into society. There were no laws regulating narcotics in India till 1985 when the NDPS Act was passed. The NDPS Act was enacted to fulfil India's treaty obligations under the Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs, Convention on Psychotropic Substances, and the United Nations Convention Against Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances.

The NDPS Act prohibits a person from the production/manufacturing/cultivation, possession, sale, purchasing, transport, storage, and/or consumption of any narcotic drug or psychotropic substance. According to the Act, narcotic drugs include coca leaf, cannabis (hemp), opium, and poppy straw; and psychotropic substances include any natural or synthetic material or any salt or preparation protected by the Psychotropic Substances Convention of 1971. A psychotropic drug includes any natural or synthetic material or any salt or preparation protected by the Psychotropic Substances Convention of 1971.



Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act (India)

The offences under the Act attract jail terms ranging from one year to 20 years and fine depending on the crime. Under the Act, property acquired by a person from drug-related offences, who has been convicted under the Act can be seized, frozen and forfeited by the government. All the offences under the NDPS Act are non-bailable. Also, no relief can be sought by the drug convicts by termination, remission, and commutation of sentences passed.

SCHEMES

Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana

Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana (PM-BJP) is a scheme launched by the Department of Pharmaceuticals in 2008 under the name Jan Aushadhi Campaign. It was revamped as PMBJP in 2015-16. Bureau of Pharma PSUs of India is the implementation agency of PMBJP. All drugs procured under this scheme are tested for quality assurance at National Accreditation Board Laboratories accredited laboratories and are compliant with World Health Organisation's Good Manufacturing Practices benchmarks. The procured generic medicines are sold at 50% to 90% lesser prices as compared to the market prices of branded medicines. The product basket of PMBJP comprises 1451 drugs and 240 surgical instruments. Further, new medicines and nutraceuticals products like protein powder, malt-based food supplements, protein bar, immunity bar, glucometers etc. have also been launched. Under PMBJP, Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Kendras (PMBJK) are set up across the country so as to reduce the out-of-pocket expenses for health care. Government grants of up to 2.5 Lakhs are provided for setting up of PMBJKs.

Objectives of PMBJP -

To make available quality medicines, consumables, and surgical items at affordable prices for all and reduce out of pocket expenditure of consumers.

To popularise generic medicines among the masses and dispel the prevalent notion that low priced generic medicines are of inferior quality and less effective.

To ensure easy availability of menstrual health services to all the women across India.

To generate employment by engaging individual entrepreneurs in the opening of PMBJK.





Sweekruti Scheme (Odisha)

The Government of Odisha formulated an umbrella scheme 'Sweekruti' to secure the rights of transgender persons and ensure equitable justice. It recognises that transgender persons are subject to discrimination and hardships in society.

The main objectives of the scheme are to create an enabling environment for transgender persons, ensure their participation and social integration, strengthen the implementation of various schemes and facilities, and promote measures for employment and socio-educational services for transgender persons.

The key strategies proposed to implement the scheme and make the services available to the transgender persons are:

Survey and identify all transgender persons in the State, and issue certificates and multipurpose smart cards.

Assist the parents of transgender children and provide pre and post-matric scholarship.

Upgrade skills and entrepreneurship development training by strengthening self-help groups.

Provide support for critical health care and group insurance support for transgender persons.

Provide legal aid, counselling and guidance services for transgender persons.

Organize awareness and sensitisation campaigns on rights of transgender persons and provide training to staff and volunteers.

CURRENT AFFAIRS



1. Integration of eSanjeevani with ABDM

This integration will help existing eSanjeevani users to easily create their Ayushman Bharat Health Account (ABHA). Users would also be able to use it to link and manage their existing health records. Users can further share their health records with doctors on eSanjeevani, which in turn will help in better clinical decision making and ensuring the continuum of care. The Ayushman Bharat Digital Mission aims to build digital highways, in a bid to bridge the gaps in existing digital health solutions and stakeholders in India.

2. SHRESTHA (Scheme for Residential Education for Students in High Schools in Targeted Areas) Scheme:

The SHRESHTHA scheme was launched by Union Minister for Social Justice and Empowerment Dr Virendra Kumar on June 3, 2022. This scheme was launched for Scheduled Castes, as they have faced historical injustices in a hierarchical based society and education is the most powerful tool to empower them as a community. Scheme will provide a level playing field to the poor and meritorious SC students. It was launched with the aim of providing quality education & opportunities to 3,000 students, who belong to scheduled caste category. envisions high quality free residential education for meritorious SC students of class 9th to class 12th to meritorious students from SC communities.

3. Bihar: Elephant rescue Centre at Valmiki Tiger Reserve:

An elephant rescue centre has been established by the forest department of Bihar at Valmiki Tiger Reserve at West Champaran district of Bihar. The elephant rescue centre will be used to rehabilitate stray, abandoned and injured elephants. This facility is yet to be approved by the central government.

4. Assam Baikho Festival:

The Baikho festival is celebrated in the state of Assam, which is called the gateway to northeast India. It is celebrated by Rabha tribes of India. The Baikho festival is celebrated annually. It is celebrated to bring in the auspicious harvest season and to fill it with abundant crops and good health. This is a celebration of a good harvest. It is an ancient tradition. It is predominantly observed by the Rabha Tribe. However, people from other communities also harmonise in the celebrations.

5.Sagarmala Young Professional Scheme:

The Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways has launched a scheme called "Sagarmala Young Professional Scheme", in a bid to engage talented, dynamic and forward-thinking young professionals in different divisions of the Ministry. Sagarmala Young Professional scheme focuses on active on-the-ground learning for young professionals. Through this scheme, these professionals will gain the opportunity to learn about the functioning of government and developmental policy concerns.





6.Kerala: Suraksha-Mitra Project:

The Suraksha-Mitra project has become operational in the State of Kerala. Suraksha-Mitra Project is a vehicle monitoring system. It sends distress messages in case of any accident. The Motor Vehicle Department has launched this project under Nirbhaya Scheme. This system will send a distress message to owners' mobile phones, if there are any untoward incidents while travelling.

7.Anocovax: India's first COVID-19 vaccine for animals:

On June 13, 2022, the Ministry of Agriculture unveiled India's first Covid-19 vaccine "Anocovax" for animals. Vaccine has been developed by Hisar-based National Research Centre on Equines. It can protect animals against Delta and Omicron variants of coronavirus. The vaccine can be used in dogs, leopards, mice, lions, and rabbits. It is an inactivated vaccine that has been developed using an infectious part of the Delta variant. Apart from that, the vaccine uses Alhydrogel as an adjuvant to boost immune response. This is the first Covid-19 vaccine developed in India, for animals.



Draft National Policy on Persons with Disabilities (PwD):

The Social Justice and Empowerment Ministry has invited public feedback on the New Draft National Policy on Disability (PwD), that proposes interventions in disability prevention, healthcare, education, accessibility and social security. According to the draft, one-third of most disabilities in children were preventable, if detected timely and early. States and Union Territories should add a provision on compliance with the 2016 Act while giving permission or recognition to educational institutions. Disability module should also be included in MBBS and other medical courses.

Balika Panchayat Initiative:

India's first-ever girl Panchayat, called "Balika Panchayat", was started in several villages of Kutch district in Gujarat. The Balika Panchayat Initiative was started with the aim of promoting social and political development of girls as well as ensuring active participation of girls in politics. The Balika Panchayat initiative was started by the Women and Child Development Welfare department of Gujarat Government. It was launched under the 'Beti Bachao Beti Padhao' campaign.
