

Webinar on 'Community Mental Health during the Pandemic'



On the 4th of March, at 11:30 AM, the group Scarlett conducted a webinar on the topic 'Community Mental Health during the Pandemic'. The speaker invited to the session was Dr. Manor Kumar. The Webinar was initiated by course faculty, Dr. S Kanagaraj as part of the Community Development curriculum. Team Scarlett of 1st year MSW conducted this webinar. The team consisted of Ms. Abhirami Shaj, MS. Aishwarya Beji, Ms. Alka D, Ms. Angel Brooson, Ms. Anjana Babu, Ms. Anushree M Krishnan. The program started with the prayer and followed by the welcome speech. Mr. T Sathishkumar felicitated the guest speaker and encouraged the students with his words and mentioned how webinars could help in community organisation and social work. The resource person, Dr. Manoj Kumar, was then introduced by the students. He is the director and founder of Mental Health Action Trust (MHAT). The organisation provides mental health care to the underprivileged sections in Kerala by adopting a unique model that engages a local community. For his contribution to mental health, Dr Manoj Kumar was awarded the prestigious Ashoka award.

After his introduction, Dr. Manoj Kumar started the session about 'Community Mental Health in the Pandemic', but first, he spoke of his organisation. Since its establishment thirteen years ago, the organisation has helped about 6000 clients. Targeted towards the extremely underprivileged, services are provided free of cost and made as understandable as possible. cho social intervention, rehabilitation, and livelihood generation. Dr. Manoj Kumar spoke of the prevalence of mental health issues before the pandemic. Mental health issues were worse amongst the differently-abled and women, which include genetic, environmental and nutritional problems.

The topic was then brought to how the pandemic brought about new fears due to social isolation, fear of disease and loss of family. Dr. Manoj also mentioned how mental health problems were now being openly spoken about, compared to before. He followed it up with a discussion about the development and working of the trust. The trust made sure to include decentralisation, volunteering, task sharing, and technology. These are incorporated with video conferencing, data base, mobile app and generation of e-prescriptions.

Coping with the COVID pandemic, clients were taken care of via online sessions. Regulations for mental health during the pandemic include being kept well informed, regulating screen time and social media as well as having a routine. Dr Manoj, concluded the session by providing general recommendations on the pandemic. It was followed by the question answer session in which a few students raised questions and their queries were answered by the speaker. The session was then officially closed with the vote of thanks.

Report on Field Visit to Tribal Research Centre at Nilgiri, Tamil Nadu



On 12th March 2022, Department of Social Work, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham, Coimbatore, organised a field exposure trip to Tribal Research Centre, Nilgiri district, for the 1st year MSW students as a part of the student induction programme

The Tribal Research Centre acts as an integral part of the planned development of the indigenous community. The district of Nilgiri has a presence of six Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups identified by the Government of India like Todas, Kotas, Irulas, Kurumbas, Paniyans and Kattunayikars. They have inhabited the place since ages in Nilgiri mountain range of Western Ghats.

The Tribal Research Centre at Nilgiri district is one of the oldest of the fourteen Tribal Research institutes in India. The relevance of Tribal Research Centre is very much identified as 'Tribal Excellence Institute' for the welfare of the thirty-six Scheduled Tribes of Tamil Nadu.

During the visit, 35 1st year students were accompanied by Mr. V S Varunanvelu, class advisor and Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work, and Mrs. Ambika B, Secretary, Department of Social Work. On visiting the Tribal Museum, Mr. Varunanvelu gave the students a detailed description about the tribes' varied culture, food habits, festivals, architectural brilliance, customs, rituals and traditions with the help of videos shown related to all the tribes in Nilgiri. The field trip gave the students a glimpse into the various approaches and interventions that the social workers are to be aware of and that are to be adopted while working for the empowerment of the tribal community.



- the right to participation

The session was organised in the classroom where the students were grouped into four groups and were given each Right to be explained. Students prepared their posters using chart papers and other items like coloured papers and pens for decorating the chart paper with creative ideas.

The groups took their turn to present their posters. All the four groups came up with beautiful layouts that clearly explained the four pillars of UNCRC. After the posters were presented in the class, they were put up on the classroom wall for future reference and easy learning.



WORKSHOP REPORT ON 'THE ESSENTIALS OF COGNITIVE BEHAVIOUR THERAPY'

The Department of Social Work, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham organised a five-day workshop on 'The Essentials of Cognitive Behaviour Therapy'. The 5 day workshop was conducted from 22nd March to 26th March. Dr. Sasangan Ramanathan, Dean of the faculty of Engineering, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham Coimbatore, inaugurated the workshop and delivered the Presidential address. He emphasised the importance of understanding human problems and the application of Cognitive Behaviour Therapy in daily life. Dr. P. Rangasami, Chairperson, Department of Social Work, introduced the resource persons, Dr. S. Gurudoss, visiting professor and CBT consultant, and Mr. Selvaganesh, executive director, iINOBLE Infoway Pvt. Ltd. Coimbatore. He also stressed the importance of Cognitive Behaviour Therapy in the current scenario.

The workshop primarily focussed on creating an understanding of the principles, process, and application of Cognitive Behaviour Therapy in real life situations. This workshop intended to enrich the knowledge of the students on the various approaches in Psychology and the application of various techniques in problem solving. The session on the first day led to an understanding of the thought process, identifying unintentional and automatic thoughts. Activities were conducted to help the participants identify the concept of life situations and automatic thoughts. A live demonstration was done by the resource person both as a therapist and a client that helped the participants in understanding the technique adopted in the counselling process.. The second day of the workshop was focussed on creating an understanding on the core approaches used in counselling such as Behaviourism, Psycho-Social approach and Humanistic approach and the advan-

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tages of the Humanistic approach over the others. ABC analysis in the context of CBT, dysfunctional and functional thoughts and the process of changing core beliefs were also discussed.


The third day focussed entirely on the importance of Digital Counselling expedited by Mr. Selvaganesh. The resource person highlighted the various digital platforms existing in India for digital counselling. The advantages and disadvantages of Digital Counselling means such as video counselling, voice calls, chats, video and audio sessions were also discussed. The fourth day of the workshop was devoted to identifying automatic thoughts and core beliefs. Activities to identify Hot cognitions and automatic thoughts were conducted.

On the fifth day, the resource person gave inputs on the importance of meditation and mindfulness as an intervention for problem solving. He demonstrated the process of meditation by involving the participants. The resource person

guided a student and demonstrated Muscular relaxation technique which helped the participants to understand the process better. Dr. C S Sowndaram, Student Counsellor enlightened the participants on the other techniques in Cognitive behaviour Therapy such as Journalling, Home Work, Grade Exposure, Systematic Desensitisation, etc. The workshop ended with a valedictory programme presided by Dr. Ramesh Kumar, Head Department of Mechanical Engineering, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham, Coimbatore. Dr. Priya V, assistant professor, Department of Social Work, thanked the resource person and the participants for the success of the workshop. Mr. Surya Suresh, Ms. Jothirmayi S, Ms. Anju Babu, Ms. Aswini Ajay prepared the module and actively engaged in organising the Workshop.

ROLE OF NGOS IN INDIA'S DEVELOPMENT

Non-Government organisations (NGOs) are the groups or institutions or organisations that are not reducible to the administrative grasp and work on 'non-profit' basis with the principles like social equality, altruism and human development as their foundations. In India at present there are nearly 25,000 NGOs spread across various parts of the country. Social service has been associated with India since ancient times. It is said that even Mahatma Gandhi after attaining independence wanted the Indian National Congress to be transformed into a public service organisation. Although such a proposal was rejected, later many of staunch Gandhi followers did set up a large number of voluntary organisations across various parts of the country to carry off the constructive works on Gandhian principles. However, the real and identified registration and formation of NGOs emerged in India from the early 1970s. Immediately after their formal inception, NGOS received a greater thrust from the Government in more than one way.

The GOI during the sixth Five Year Plan (FYP) with its famous"GARIBI HATAO" slogan did recognize the importance of NGOs in the development process of India. In the seventh FYP, it gave a task of developing "self-reliance communities" to NGOs for promoting rural development. Later in the eighth FYP, the government sought to promote a nationwide network of NGOs. In its ninth FYP, it envisaged the primary role of promoting PPPS in the country. The tenth FYP envisaged the need and importance of NGOS in developing the agricultural sector by promoting awareness among the farmers about various modern farm techniques and government initiatives for their benefit. Moreover, the government has also been promoting the development of NGOs through financial aid and assistance programmes.

NGOs with the support given by the government have been accelerating their development activities by taking up specific issues like poverty alleviation, child rights, caste stigma and discrimination, women rights, child labor, rural development, water and sanitation, environmental issues etc. In the last two decades the role of NGOs have become proactive in the




social sector development. NGOs have played a crucial role in sending the school dropouts back to the school especially in rural areas thus upholding the Right to Education. NGOs have also met with huge success in the health sector development programmes like Leprosy Eradication Programme and programs on eliminating tuberculosis and malaria.

The most highlighted success of NGOs could be seen in their achievement in influencing the government to bring out various development-oriented policies and laws. Few of such laws and policies include: Right to Information, Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS), MN-REGA, Juvenile Justice, Nirmal Gram Initiative, Rashtriya Swasthya Bima Yojana (RSBY), various policies on women development, forest and environment development, anti-trafficking, etc.

WELL KNOWN SOCIAL WORKER

Gandhi's Successor-Vinoba Bhave

Vinayak Narahari, also known as Vinoba Bhave, (11 September 1895 – 15 November 1982) was an Indian advocate of non-violence and human rights. Often called Acharya, he is best known for the Bhoodan Movement. He is considered the National Teacher of India and the spiritual successor of Mahatma Gandhi. He was an eminent philosopher.

A report in the newspapers about Gandhi's speech at the newly founded Banaras Hindu University attracted Bhave's attention. He wrote a letter to Gandhi and after an exchange of letters, Gandhi advised Bhave to come for a personal meeting at Kochrab Ashram in Ahmedabad. Bhave participated with keen interest in the activities at Gandhi's ashram, like teaching, studying, spinning and improving the life of the community.

He was associated with Mahatma Gandhi in the Indian independence movement. He stayed for some time at Gandhi's Sabarmati ashram in a cottage that was named after him, 'Vinoba Kutir'. He gave talks on the Bhagab o o k b o o k form, as 'Talks on the Gita', and it has been translated into many lan-

guages both in India and elsewhere.

Bhave observed the life of the average Indian living in a village and tried to find solutions for the problems he faced with a firm spiritual foundation. This formed the core of his Sarvodaya movement. Another example of this is the Bhoodan (land gift) movement started at Pochampally on 18 April 1951, after interacting with 80 Harijan families. He walked all across India asking people with land to consider him one of their sons and so gave him one-sixth of their land which he then distributed to landless poor. Non-violence and compassion are a hallmark of his philosophy, he also campaigned against the slaughtering of cows.

> The Brahma Vidya Mandir is one of the ashrams that Bhave created. It is a small community for women that was created in order for them to become self-sufficient and non-violent in a community. This group farms to get their own food, and uses Gandhi's beliefs about food production, which include sustainability and social justice, as a guide.

In 1958 Bhave was the first recipient of the international Ramon Magsaysay Award for Community Leadership. He was awarded the Bharat Ratna posthumously in 1983.

Hope Community Village is a child care institution located in Kanjikuzhy, in the district of Alappuzha, Kerala. It was started by John Veitch, a British businessman whose coir business reached success in Alappuzha. He founded the Hope Community Village in the outskirts of Alappuzha district. Associating his friends back home in the UK, he founded Hope Community Village UK to organise goodwill and resources to support and maintain the program of Hope Community Village in Kerala.

It is one of three child care institutions of its kind in the state of Kerala. The village houses vulnerable children from different backgrounds, mostly abandoned children.

The village has six homes. Each home houses one mother and eight children. Usually only children above the age of five are admitted to the village. They are taken care of by a 'mother'. The mother is a woman who is either unmarried above the age of forty, widowed or has no more duties to her family (preferred). There is a mother's home for retired mothers in the village where one retired mother currently resides at the moment. As of now, the village currently has fifty-eight children.



Meetings held for the mothers, children and the staff on a regular basis at regular intervals of time. Every decision taken is often made in the best interest of the child. Children are encouraged to learn and grow as much as they can. Here, it is essential that each child should have at least five skills. The skills include communication, computer knowledge, cycling, swimming and any one additional skill.

Another interesting aspect of this child care institution is the fact that the institution follows the Sustainable Development Goals put forth by the United Nations. Actions taken are often aimed at upholding the SDG's.

Bonded Labour System (Abolition) Act, 1976

Bonded labour is a form of slavery in which a person and his successors are made to work for a creditor against lending of a loan, in case of failure of repayment, until the loan is repaid. Bonded labour is associated with rural economies where farmers from economically disadvantaged communities are bound to work for the landlords who exploit them. There is no defined time period when it comes to the period of bondage. The agreement of bonded labour results in loss of freedom.

The provisions in law prohibiting bonded labour are found in the form of various Acts and regulations. The main Act prohibiting it is the Bonded Labor System (Abolition) Act, 1976. It is an extension of Article 23 (Fundamental Rights) of Indian Constitution prohibiting forced labour. The Act came into force on 25 October, 1975. It has been established with an objective to provide for the abolition of the bonded labour system and prevent economic and physical exploitation of the weaker sections. Before the formulation of the Act, the efforts to fight bonded labour were only at regional level with legislation Acts found in states like Bihar, Orissa, Madras and Rajasthan.

According to the act, bonded labour is strictly abolished and any agreement related to the same has been made void. Every labourer is free from the liability to pay debt and is discharged of all obligations to render bonded labour. No creditor can accept payment against extinguished debt. If the creditor took any property under the system, the same has to be restored to the possessor from whom it was seized. Property of the bonded labourer is to be freed from mortgage. The progress of the act has included both success and failure. The Act has managed to bring about many changes to the system of bonded labour in the country, but more is yet to be done. It requires strong vigilance and taking necessary steps to ensure that the system of bonded labour is curbed.

SCHEMES

Nai Roshni Scheme

Started in 2012-13, Nai Roshni is a Leadership Development Programme for women belonging to minority communities in the age group of 18 to 65 years.

The objective of the scheme is to empower and instil confidence among minority women, including their neighbours from other communities living in the same village/locality, by providing knowledge, tools and techniques for interacting with Government systems, banks and other institutions at all levels. It is run with the help of NGOs, Civil societies and Government Institutions all over the country.

It includes various training modules like Leadership of women, Educational Programmes, Health and Hygiene, Swachch Bharat, Financial Literacy, Life Skills, Legal Rights of Women, Digital Literacy and Advocacy for Social and behavioural change.

Women and children are always the worst sufferers in a poverty-stricken family and need support. Empowering women, especially mothers, is even more important as it is in homes that she nourishes, nurtures and moulds the character of her offspring.

It helps embolden minority women to move out of the confines of their home and community and assume leadership roles and assert their rights, collectively or individually, in accessing services, facilities, skills, and opportunities besides claiming their due share of development benefits of the Government for improving their lives and living conditions.

Muslim, Sikh, Christian, Buddhist, Zoroastrian (Parsi) and Jain women notified under Section 2 (c) of the National Commission for Minorities Act, 1992 come under the target group. However, to further increase the strength of the mosaic of plurality in society and bring about solidarity and unity through their own efforts to improve their lot, the scheme permits a mix of women from non-minority communities not exceeding 25% of a project proposal.

Goa Ashraya Adhar Scheme

The state government of Goa has launched 'Ashraya Adhar Scheme' to help the Scheduled Tribe (ST) community by providing financial assistance for repair and renovation of their house. Under this scheme, up to Rs. 5,00,000 shall be advanced as financial assistance in the form of loan at 2% per annum.

Any person belonging to Scheduled Tribe Community and having his house (which shall also include mundcarial house) either owned individually or jointly will be eligible for financial assistance under this scheme. In case the house is owned jointly and there are different units of the family in the same house residing separately, each such unit will be eligible for financial support under this scheme. The age of the applicant should not be more than 55 years as on the date of loan application. However, the age of the applicant is relaxed up to 58 years in case the applicant is an employee of State/ Central Government/ Government Corporation/ Board or aided Institute.

The loan amount shall be advanced in two instalments after submission of required documents complete in all respects.

Rs. 3,75,000/- immediately after sanctioning the loan. Rs. 1,25,000/- on utilisation of the first instalment. Loanee shall commence the actual work within 03 months from the date of sanctioned amount released. The 2nd instalment to be released on submission of utilisation bills and on the basis of physical verification / inspection carried out by the officer of the Corporation.

The loan shall be repaid in 120 equated monthly instalments within a period of 10 years with a moratorium period of three months.

1. National Tuberculosis Prevalence Survey: According to the newly released National Tuberculosis Prevalence Survey 2019-2021, the highest incidents of pulmonary tuberculosis cases across the country were recorded in Delhi with the lowest being in Kerala. After six decades, this survey has been conducted and was released by the Union Health Ministry to mark World TB Day. (March 24)

2. Kerala: Identification of New Marine Species-A new Carangid species has been identified by the Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute (CMFRI) from the Indian coast of Kerala. This newly identified fish belongs to the group named 'queen fish'. In the Indian ocean there are more than sixty species of carangids. Out of them, four belong to the 'Queen Fish' group and the newly identified fish is number five. Across the globe, three queen fishes are extinct due to a lot of reasons like climate change, overfishing, etc.

3. 2021 World Air Quality Report- In 2021, air pollution continued to reach unhealthy levels according to a report on World Air Quality which was prepared by" IQAir" a Swiss organisation. Also, for the fourth year running, New Delhi remained to be the most polluted capital city in the world. 35 Indian cities have been listed by the index under the worst air quality tag for 2021. According to this report, not a single country from around the globe managed to meet the air quality standard of WHO in 2021.

International Day for the Elimination 4. of Racial Discrimination-On 21st March 2022, the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination has been observed. This day is observed annually across the globe. In 1960, on this day, at a peaceful demonstration against the apartheid pass laws in South Africa the police opened fire which resulted in 69 deaths, and 180 injuries. In 1966, the international community was asked by the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) to increase its efforts to eliminate racial discrimination. In 1979, UNGA adopted a number of activities to be undertaken to combat racism. UNGA decided that a week of solidarity against racism would be organised annually starting from 21st March."VOIC-ES FOR ACTION AGAINST RACISM" is the theme for this year.

5. 'Meri Policy Mere Haath' campaign-'Meri Policy Mere Haath' campaign was launched in Hassan, Karnataka. 'Meri Policy Mere Haath' campaign is part of the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana. The campaign is aimed at motivating all farmers in the country to insure their crops. Under this program, every farmer who has taken insurance under the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (PMFBY) will get the policy documents at their doorstep.

6. India's Largest Reclining Statue of Lord Buddha-The largest reclining statue of Lord Buddha in India is being built in Bodh Gaya, Bihar. India's Buddhist pilgrimage

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circuit is being proactively revived and Bodh Gaya is an integral part of it. Hence, the site of Gautam Buddha's enlightenment will soon be home to his largest reclining statue.

7. 'Desh ke Mentor' Programme -The Mentor programme Desh ke was launched in October 2021 by the state government of Delhi. This programme was launched with the aim of connecting students who are studying in classes 9 to 11 with voluntary mentors. The idea of this programme was that young mentors will be able to guide students regarding matters related to career options, higher education, higher education entrance exams preparation, and dealing with pressure.

8. 100% Electrification of Konkan Railways-The Konkan Railway Corporation has finished electrification of its entire 741-kilometre route that stretches from Roha, Maharashtra to Thokur, Karnataka. By December 2023, the Indian Railways have plans for 100 percent electrification of its broad-gauge network. This electrification of the 741-kilometre stretch will bring about savings of fuel amounting to Rs 150 crore.lt will also reduce the dependence on diesel along with ensuring pollution-free, seamless operations.

9. AICTE Internship Opportunities -Over 1 lakh internship opportunities have been launched by Union education minister Dharmendra Pradhan through the All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) internship portal. The internship opportunities have been announced with the aim of enhancing the students' employability skills.Technical students, as well as higher education students studying under the University Grants Commission (UGC), would be able to take part in the AICTE internship opportunities. 10. National Education Society for Tribal Students -National Education Society for Tribal Students (NESTS) is an autonomous organisation that was established

under the Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA). On 2nd April 2022, this organisation will be celebrating its fourth Foundation Day. NESTS and the Ministry of Tribal Affairs have set up targets to complete the construction of a total of 452 new schools and the pending 67 schools under its old scheme by the year 2025.
