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
#### **ABOUT AMRITA UDAAN**




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## GENDER SENISITIZATION PROGRAMME; AT VEERAPANUR VILLAGE

Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham, Coimbatore, Department of Social Work first year students organized a community awareness program on "Gender Sensitization" at Veerapanur village, on 07-06-2023, 3pm. Adhivishnu Vinith V, Anjali S, Athira, Shyama Surendran, Devika, Gopika Rajan, Induja S, Namitha K, Namitha R, and Vinaya were tasked with planning and executing the agenda. Following the arrival in the village, the main team interacted with the people and children living at Veerapanur village street in order to acquire basic village information and pressing concerns that the village is currently facing. The questions were categorized into different formats which include significance of the village, social contracts, isolation & control, occupations & employment and education & health. Along with collecting the data needed for rural immersion report students engaged with the community for mobilizing the people for the awareness programme. Almost 25-30 people along with children gathered to witness the awareness programme.

Dona and Surya, first-year MSW students, performed a riveting dance to mobilize the villagers and attract the children. Following that, Programme Host Shyama Surendran addressed the audience by reciting a famous quote by social activist Periyar. The students performed two well-known cultural art forms, Oyilattam and Kolattam. Undeniably, the villagers enjoyed the program and also danced along with the students. Later, the street play team performed an act on "Gender Sensitisation" which was narrated by Adhivishnu, and the drama team displayed impeccable professionalism in their performance. Overall, the act undoubtedly created a lasting impact on the people who witnessed the street play. Following the drama's narration, Faculty Professor Dr.S.Kanagaraj briefed the audience on the program and highlighted numerous examples of gender discrimination that people face today. Athira then delivered the vote of thanks. Following the vote of thanks, Anjali S read the pledge on gender sensitisation and asked the villagers to repeat the words to emphasize the importance of gender equality. Everyone who gathered took the pledge and provided feedback to a few students, and the program was unquestionably well received and appreciated by the people. Likewise, Students thanked everyone individually before boarding the bus and returned to the college. Without a doubt, this visit taught everyone how to work together and establish better rapport with the villagers.

#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAMME: AWARENESS ON ALCOHOLISM

As a part of the Community Outreach Program, under the direction of faculty coordinator Dr. S. Kanagaraj and the first year students of social work department at Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham organised a rural outreach initiative on alcoholism in Arunthathiyar Street, Ettimadai on June 9, 2023. Teams of students were formed, and they were given the tasks of performing Kolattam, Oyilattam, and a play on alcoholism. Additionally, resource persons include Antony Vijay Anand and Mr. Jayakanthan from Alcoholic Anonymous group and Mr. Ayappan, Constable of the Chavadi Police Station were invited to raise awareness about alcoholism. Students used the college bus to get to the neighbourhood by 3:30 pm on the day of the programme. Teams of students were deployed into the village to engage with the locals and gather information for a consolidated report on rural immersion. After gathering the data, the students organised the locals for the awareness campaign. Dr. S. Kanagaraj, the faculty supervisor, welcomed the guests and members of the community before beginning the session. Then the programme started with cultural events like Kolattam, Oyilattam, and students performed play against alcoholism. Following that, Chavadi Police Station Constable Mr. Ayappan addressed the community. Then Mr Jayakanthan from Alcoholic Anonymous group addressed the crowd, giving a brief history of the AA organisation and how it has been successful in preventing alcoholism by not taking caste, colour, religion, or other factors into account. The ill effects of alcohol were discussed, as well as family troubles, health problems (liver issues), relationship destruction, behaviour changes, and blackouts. He discussed the withdrawal symptoms. They disseminated notices with contact information. The program's academic supervisor and student coordinator expressed their thanks to the guests and members of the local community at its conclusion.

## Y20 TALK ON CLIMATE ACTION AT KUMARAGURU COLLEGE OF TECHNOLOGY

Few students from I MSW along with Mr. T. Satish Kumar- Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work took part in the Y20 talk on Climate Action conducted at Kumaraguru College of Technology on June 10, 2023. Eric Solheim (6th Executive Director of the UN Environment Programme and governing council member at Tamil Nadu Climate Council Committee) said India could lead the world in producing electric vehicles to meet the increasing demand. He said "The circular economy is the way forward and so much innovation can happen in the area. It will help in job creation as well. There are more valuable components in 1kg of electronic waste than 1kg of ore from which gold is extracted.



Coimbatore city police commissioner V Balakrishnan said, with over three lakh young people employed in the field, Coimbatore is experiencing an IT boom. Action on climate change at the individual and community levels can have a significant impact. He said more trees will be planted in police facilities. As a police officer, if we must think about the future, we anticipate two kinds of crime in the future. One is cybercrime and the other is environment related crimes.

#### **TECHNOLOGY FOR CLIMATE ACTION**

Balakumar Thangavelu (India Head-outreach, employee volunteering CSR, Global Lead-ESG, building sustainable supply chain partners Cognizant) Started the panel discussion with a story of Dodo bird. Dodo looks like a duck and its predominance was in the Mauritius Islands. Mauritius was in-



vaded by Britishers and they started eating dodo and dodo species became extinct. Calvaria tree also got extinct, a lot of researchers have planted seed of calvaria tree at multiple places around the world and it doesn't grow at all and after a lot of research the researchers realized that the fruit has to be consumed by dodo and it has to be come through its poop to attain regenerative capacity. So, Biodiversity and every action that each one of us does has a replica effect. Technology plays a vital role towards achieving Net zero.

Sundar Muruganandhan, Superfan Founder and Managing Director, Versa Drives shared his words on using technology to reach up the ladder without af-

fecting the environment. Hari Prasad, founder - Beyond Sustainability Network shared his words on Carbon Accounting. Hari said that "all of us are talking about the effects of climate change. If we really want to solve the climate change issue, we must solve the cause, not the effect. Carbon emissions are the cause for climate change and we should reduce our carbon emissions.

Kavinkumar Kandasamy, CEO-ProClime and Managing Director of Mangalam Educational Institutions, said "climate is not an option, it's a mandate." He also said that energy efficiency increases opportunity, every discipline relates to climate and is a climate industry, every bit of skill set we have can be connected back to climate.

#### CLIMATIC LITERACY AND CLIMATE ACTION

Saravanan Chandrasekaran, Managing Trustee-Wild Wing Trust and Founder-Canopy Nature Academy, mentioned about agriculture village in remotest part of Erode district called Malli Amman durgham, an agrarian community and still they live without electricity and they have continued to survive seven decades while other parts of the world are advanced in technology. He said that such communities like this are already being a role model on how low carbon life can be managed. Jayaprakash, Associate Professor and Head-Department of Communication at PSG College of Arts and Science, shared his words on Understanding what it takes for a customer to realize their choice of food consumption is related to climate action in terms of sustainable food production. He said that the amount we spent on hospitals is more than we spent on our food. He pointed out that both food and our environment are polluted and without our knowledge we are spending more on hospitals. He also added that, to get better food, prefer farmers who practice ethical farming and support farmers who are not using pesticides.

Bharathi Dasan, Secretary-Arulagam, stated that the term 'climate change' should be replaced with 'climate destruction'. We Human beings are responsible for climate change and it is not natural, it is man-made, that's why it should be termed as climate destruction and not as climate change. Mrs. Sujani Balu, Convenor at Siruthuli an NGO, shared few words on importance of climate action and she also mentioned Siruthuli's work in desilting eight major water bodies in Coimbatore. Jayakumar concluded his speech by saying "we don't need App; we need sleep and that can be given only by nature". The question of whether we are sustaining a habitable environment is more important than big buildings or an airport, Bharathi Dasan said as he wrapped up his remarks. He added that we should show more respect to individuals who choose to walk and ride bicycles.




## INTERACTION PROGRAMME WITH MELOOR GRAMA PANCHAYAT REPRESENTATIVES




## "MAYA VISAI"-EDUCATION AWARENESS PROGRAMME

The students walked around the village and observed various things. The survey was conducted mainly to know about the village's traditions, socio-economic conditions, health, education and culture. The students were able to interact with the people and know about their problems. The villagers were also open to talk about their mind.

The event started by 5.30 pm and was hosted by Mr. Rahul S and Ms. Rithanva K K. After welcome address there were cultural events like Kolattam and Oyilattam performed by the students. The children in the village were engaged by a game session to make them actively participate in the program. A rally was conducted where the children actively participated by preaching slogans on the importance of education. This video was watched by the children and older ones of the village along with the students. ## YAVARUM NALAM-AWARENESS ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Students of first year MSW, Department of Social Work, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham organized a community awareness program on "Domestic Violence" at MGR Colony, Pichanur Panchayat on 16th June 2023, around 5:00 pm in the evening.

The students along with Assistant Professor Dr. S Kanagaraj boarded the bus and left for the village which is located within a 4 Km radius of the university. Upon reaching, the organizing team grouped students under different tasks which were carried out with ease. Most of the students started their village exploration by observing various factors and identifying indicators through a transect walk and community engagement meanwhile, the rest of the students started setting up for the program at the village community hall. The survey majorly dealt with understanding the traditional, socio-economic, cultural, political and psychological aspects of the community. The students had a good interaction with the people and identified their problems and also observed various things in the community. The survey questions were categorized into social contracts, isolation & control, occupations and employment, and education and health. After collecting the required information from the community, students started to mobilize the community people for the program and activities. Mobilization at MGR Colony was challenging as people of the community haven't been exposed to such community organization programs that aim to bring them awareness and raise their conscience about the world outside. It was observed that initially people were rather reserved and felt hesitant to be part of the program which made mobilizing them into the community hall a challenging task, which was resolved by students' active involvement and engagement in convincing the people to participate. An icebreaker session was conducted in order to make people feel included and at home which gave a positive response.

The guest speaker for the program Ms. Vishnupriya, Police Constable, K. G. Chavadi Police Station reached the program venue around 5:00 PM. The resource person also helped with her input in mobilizing the community. The crowd was also joined by Mr. V. S. Varunanvelu,

The awareness program started at 5.30 pm with around 40 people gathered in the hall. After a short session with the guest the students of the team came forward to educate the crowd about the basics of domestic violence. Mr Ragesh M briefed about the Domestic Violence Act, 2005 and Ms Minha Fatima spoke about the importance of the One Stop Centre Scheme.

Later Mr. V. S. Varunavelu addressed the crowd and also gave awareness to the people and also demonstrated a toll-free helpline call to the people to give them more understanding and clarity on the subject.

After the guests addressed the crowd, the event took a cultural turn where the students gave a riveting performance to engage kids and community people with folk dances such as oyilattam and kolattam to emphasize the importance of Tamil culture and traditional values.

Guest Speaker Ms. Vishnu Priya addressed the crowd and gave valuable information and awareness to the people about Domestic Violence. She gave legal awareness on The Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act. She also shared information about domestic violence cases handled by her. She explained about the POCSO Act to people and made the community people interact throughout the program.

Dr.S Kanagaraj, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work and faculty Coordinator shared the mic in giving awareness to the community and also explained the importance of participation in such community programs and appreciated the students for their continued efforts and contribution in arranging the program. The guest was felicitated with a memento by the village tuition teacher Ms Anthony Jeeva who cooperated and helped with organizing the program.

Activities and programs were arranged for children to make them joyful. Ms Pavya K and Ms Tharshana C narrated moral stories to the children which they enjoyed and also motivated children to share their own stories. Following that, all students performed a dance and they participated very actively in the dance program. The program ended at 6.40 pm. Students thanked community people for their participation in the program. Without any doubt, the visit taught the students about the mobilization of new communities, event management and how to work with communities for their betterment and to take steps to bring about social changes. This experience will contribute immensely to their social work practice in community development.

Mr. Akhil, CSR consultant, Propel Industries Pvt Ltd. then gave a guest talk on solid waste management in a lively manner by interacting with the children and the villagers making them understand about SWM. 

## COMMUNITY BASED SOCIAL WORK INTERVENTION

#### **EFFORTS OF MSW STUDENTS**

#### Introduction:

The Veerappanur village is a small settlement with approximately 20 to 35 houses located in the Pichanur Panchayat of Coimbatore district, Tamilnadu. The village has access to most of the basic facilities required for survival such as water, electricity and transportation. Apart from that people in the village also give importance to educating their young minds. There are two government schools located within 2 Km radius of the village. The village also has an Anganwadi centre that functions under the Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), which the social work department of Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham took charge to make sure it's restoration and repair.



#### **Pre-planning:**

The idea of renovating the ICDS centre was put

forth among the 1st Year MSW students during their village visit during their community organisation program. Students willing came forward to be a part of the team and immediately started working on the design plan, budgeting, and implementation under the guidance of Dr. S. Kanagaraj, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham.

The project was sponsored by Janatics India Pvt Ltd, a leading company in Coimbatore supplying pneumatic products. On the evening of 20 June, 2023. Dr. S. Kanagaraj along with the student in-charges, community member Mr Vignesh, met with the representative from Janatics India Pvt Ltd at Kannan Traders, K.G. Chavadi, to draw up the quotations and final budget related to purchase of paint and related materials required for the project.

The student in-charge Ms Pooja Jayaram, Ms Kanya, Mr Adarsh and Mr Shijo Kurian Thomas paid a visit to the village on the 22 June, 2023 prior to starting the actual work to check on the conditions of the centre to develop a plan that will well suit the needs of the villagers and the children using the facility.

Day scholar students had joined hands with the community members, to start the initial cleaning and scrubbing of the building, who had participated on the evening of June 23, 2023 to clean the centre for the smooth execution of the plan.

#### Implementation:

DAY 1:

On June 24, 2023, the long-awaited plan was finally initiated. A group of 20 students along with Dr. S. Kanagaraj started for the village using the college transportation facility around 9:00 AM that Saturday

morning. The village is located 7 Km distance from the college and upon reaching the village students took help from the appointed professional painter Mr Kumar who assisted with the paint job. Students then divided into teams taking up different roles of renovating the building. Work was carried on vigorously as students worked on the exterior and interior parts of the building simultaneously. For most being first time painters, students showcased their active participation and hard work throughout the day with timely refreshments and resting periods. The involvement of community people and the ICDS staff and helpers Ms Bhanumathi and Ms Pappathi also were of immense help. Day one wrapped up around 7:30 PM and was a huge success as the overall baseline paint job was completed and design sketches were made for further work.

#### DAY 2:

The second day, 25.06.2023, a group of 20 students along with Dr. S. Kanagaraj and a student volunteer Mr. Yeshwant, 1st year Department of Applied Statistics, started for the village at 9:00 Am. Students were appointed with their roles and divided into teams to finish the work effectively. A group of students worked in the kitchen and washroom as the others who were good with painting worked on covering the syllabus on the walls with vibrant colours and eye-catching artwork. The day was dedicated for the same as it required incredible patience and talent to depict the images onto the wall. The day was wrapped up by 8:00 PM.

#### DAY 3:

After their regular classes a group of 12 students with the help of Dr. S. Kanagaraj and Mr. V. S. Varunavelu, Assistant Professors, Department of Social Work reached the village around 4:00 Pm in the evening on 26.06.2023 to finish the remaining work. The unpainted segments and exterior walls were filled with remaining paint and the final finishing touches were given to the sketches and windows. Finally, the students and staff appreciated and thanked the community people for the active involvement, dedication, help and participation throughout the whole process.

#### **Outcomes:**

The ICDS centre turned out good as new and better than expected, thanks to all the students, faculty and community members that contributed their best as their work will remain in the community for years to come.

This experience provided students enormous opportunities to sculpt their talents and foster skills such as teamwork, coordination, resilience, creativity, communication, organization, planning, timely execution, improvisation and optimum utilization of available resources. It created a platform to engage, involve and work alongside the community people. It created challenging situations that tested participants' patience, physical ability, strength, attitudes and cooperation through which they stayed united as a team focusing on finishing the task at hand within the given stipulated time period.

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## PARTICIPATION IN INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON INDIAN RURAL PUBLIC HEALTH AND NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

The 2nd International Conference on Indian Rural Public Health and Non-Communicable Diseases was jointly organized by the KMCH Research Foundation and the KMCH Institute of Health Sciences and Research. The conference was held on June 23rd and 24th at KMCH in Coimbatore, with the theme of 'Addressing the Challenges of NCDs and Prevention and Control of NCDs in Rural India.' The objective of the conference was to address critical changes and emerging issues related to public health in rural communities, with a specific focus on combating non-communicable diseases (NCDs). Over the course of the two-day conference, various talks and research papers were presented, discussing innovative approaches for the prevention, early detection, and screening of NCDs in rural populations. Additionally, topics such as novel diagnostics and therapeutics approaches for NCDs, and the utilization of biomedical engineering and nanobiotechnology techniques for NCDs, were explored. The distinguished speakers at the conference included Dr. J. Amalopavanathan, a member of the State Planning Commission, Prof. Mithieux Gilles, Dr. P. Sundaresan, Dr. Sivaprakash Ramalingam, Dr. Thomas Alexander, Prof. Ankayarkanni, Dr. Perundurai S Dhandapani, and Dr. Immanual Gilwax Prabhu. During the conference, a wide range of topics were discussed, including 'Microbiota and its Metabolites: Health Benefits of Intestinal Gluconeogenesis,' 'Fighting Cancer with Cell Therapy: The Future of Oncology, 'Social Isolation and Depression among the Elderly in an Indian Urban Slum Population,"Unmet Menstrual Practice Needs among College-Attending Girls in the Coimbatore District, and 'Examination-Related Anxiety Levels and Coping Strategies Adopted by Undergraduate Students at a Medical College in Central Karnataka.'

#### PARTICIPATION IN WORLD DRUG AWARENESS DAY

World Drug Day or The International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking is observed on June 26th of every year to strengthen action and cooperation in achieving a world free of drug abuse. Total 27 participants including CWC members and chairpersons from several districts attended the training programme. 10 students from 1st year MSW got the opportunity to attend the programme. The programme was coordinated by Mr. V S Varunanvelu, Assistant Professor of the Department of Social Work at Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham, and Mr. Arun Vignesh, Team Leader of the Mainstreaming Department of the Integrated training Centre for Social Empowerment.

On 26th the event began with the inauguration. Dr. P. Rangasami, Head of the Social Work Department of Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham, delivered the welcome address. Shyam Surendran, 1st year MSW delivered the MOC. Alfred David, Chief Probation Officer, Department of Defence, Tamil Nadu, was honoured by Dr. Sasangan Ramanathan, Dean of Engineering, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham. The main guest, Mr. Alfred David, then addressed the crowd.

The first session was on the Status of Institutionalised Children in Tamil Nadu, which was led by Mr. Arun Viknesh. The following session focused on CWC's responsibilities and mandate to strengthen alternative care. Mr Alfred David led the session. He covered the different alternatives to CCIs and hostels, such as adoption, foster care, sponsorship, and fit person. The following presentation was given by Mr. R Senthil Kumar, Regional Probation Officer, Department of Social Defence, and it focused on the importance of ICPs (Individual Care Plans). Then he conducted a session on CISS (Children in Street Situation). CISS refers to children living on the pavement. He talked about three CISS classifications. That's all for the first day.

The next day started with the session on Importance of Social Investigation Report and reviewing of CWC orders Coordination with the DCPU by Mr. Alfred David. The following session was conducted by Team Miracle on Importance of Convergence, Inter-linkages with government schemes and case study analyses. In the afternoon session E.V.Chandru , Advocate, High Court of Madras handled 2 segments on Roles and Responsibilities of CWC Do's and Don'ts and Importance of Support Persons while handling POCSO Victims. With this 2nd day came to an end.

The training programme was a new experience for the MSW students. It gave them the idea about the CWC and its significance.



## MENSTRUAL HEALTH AND HYGIENE PROGRAM



# SCHEMES AND ACTS



#### **ACTS**

#### PREVENTION OF ATROCITIES ACT (PoA) - 1989

Prevention of atrocities act also known as SC ST act was enacted to prohibit discrimination against people belonging to SC and ST communities and to prevent atrocities against them. This act has been enacted to safeguard the fundamental rights put forth in the constitution i.e

- 1. Articles 15 (Prohibition of Discrimination)
- 2. Article 17 (Abolition of Untouchability)
- 3. Article 21 (Protection of Life and Personal Liberty)

The objectives of this act are to protect the members of these vulnerable communities and to provide relief and rehabilitation to the victims of the atrocities. This act has been amended twice, one in 2015 and the other in 2018.

Features of SC and AT Amendment Act 2015

- People involved in atrocities related to physical, verbal, social, economic, politics, insults, manual scavenging, carrying or disposing animal or human carcass will be put behind bars
- The offences like hurt, grievous hurt, intimidation, kidnapping etc. against persons belonging to SC/ST can will be sentenced 10 years or less of imprisonment
- Establishment of special courts and exclusive special courts to run trials of offence made against these vulnerable people
- Exclusive Special Public Prosecutors are appointed to run the trial of offences committed under PoA act
- Willful negligence of public servants in filing charge sheet against these offences will also be provided with appropriate punsihment

Features of SC and ST Amendment Act 2018

- Section 18 A nullifies the conduct of a preliminary enquiry before registration of an FIR
- Person who has been accused of atrocities against SC ST people will not be provided any anticipatory bail
- This act provides the Investigation Officer the independence to arrest the accused person without any approval from any authority

## CENTRAL SCHEME-AYUSHMAN BHARAT YOJANA (ABY)

Ayushman Bharat Programme is an umbrella health scheme of the Government of India. It was launched in 2018 by Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The Ayushman Bharat programme was launched in 2018 to address health issues at all levels – primary, secondary, and tertiary. It has two components:

- Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PM-JAY), earlier known as the National Health Protection Scheme (NHPS)
- Health and Wellness Centres (HWCs)

Ayushman Bharat is an integrated approach comprising health insurance and primary, secondary and tertiary healthcare. The HWCs are aimed at improving access to cheap and quality healthcare services at the primary level. PM-JAY will cover the financial protection for availing healthcare services at the secondary and tertiary levels. Ayushman Bharat is the largest government-funded healthcare programme in the world with over 50 crore beneficiaries. It has been dubbed 'Modicare'. The 71st round of the National Sample Survey Office (NSSO) revealed many grim numbers about the country's healthcare system. About 86% of rural households and 82% of urban households do not have access to healthcare insurance. Unexpected and serious healthcare problems often lead families to debt. Over 19% and over 24% of the urban and rural households respectively meet their healthcare financial needs through borrowings. To address these grave concerns, the government, under the National Health Policy 2017, launched the Ayushman Bharat programme along with its two sub-missions, PM-JAY and HWCs.

#### BENEFITS UNDER THE SCHEME:

- Ayushman Bharat- Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PMJAY) will provide a cover of up to Rs. 5 lakhs per family per year, for secondary and tertiary care hospitalization.
- Over 10.74 crore vulnerable entitled families (approximately 50 crore beneficiaries) will be eligible for these benefits.
- PMJAY will provide cashless and paperless access to services for the beneficiary at the point of service.
- PMJAY will help reduce catastrophic expenditure for hospitalizations, which impoverishes people and will help mitigate the financial risk arising out of catastrophic health episodes.
- Entitled families will be able to use the quality health services they need without facing financial hardships.
- When fully implemented, PMJAY will become the world's largest fully government-financed health protection scheme. It is a visionary step towards advancing the agenda of Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

#### STATE GOVERNMENT SCHEME-FREE BICYCLE SCHEME

A free bicycle programme has been announced by the state government of Tamil Nadu for 2022. All students enrolled in government schools or associated institutions run by the Tamil Nadu Government will receive free bicycles with the implementation of this programme. Free bicycles will be given to kids who find it difficult to go to school without a vehicle through the adoption of the scheme, allowing a greater number of pupils to get to school on time.

The government of Tamil Nadu has introduced a programme that provides free bicycles, and it has several advantages. The proper use of school time by the pupils, especially those who were undoubtedly late because they did not own a vehicle, will be one of the key advantages of the scheme's implementation. The free bike will make it easier for the students to arrive at class on time and continue with their lectures without missing anything. Additionally, students don't have to worry about transportation costs when they attend class every day.

The pupils who attend the government schools in the ensuing districts will receive the free bicycles:

- Chennai
- Kanchipuram
- Chengalpattu
- Vellore
- Ranipet
- Tirupathur
- Villupuram
- Kallakurichi
- Tirunelveli
- Thenkasi

The initial goal of the free bicycle programme was to motivate female students to continue their education. It was introduced by the late J. Jayalalitha, a former chief minister, in 2001–2002. However, the programme was formerly exclusively available to SC/ST pupils enrolled in higher secondary. Due to the government's success with the prior programme, it has been reinstated for all 11th-grade students enrolled in government schools in Tamil Nadu, regardless of gender or caste.

#### **ELIGIBLE CRITERIA**

Follow the straightforward eligibility requirements listed below to qualify for the free bicycle programme in Tamil Nadu State: -

A permanent resident of Tamil Nadu is required for the application.

A student in their eleventh grade must apply.

The applicant must attend a public, public aided, or partially supported institution of higher education.

The school's on-campus dorms are not permitted for students to stay there.

Additionally ineligible are the pupils of residential schools.

#### 1. GPS AIDED GEO AUGMENTED NAVIGATION-JUNE 3, 2023

Technology developments are essential for guaranteeing safety, precision, and efficiency in the constantly changing world of aviation. The GPS Aided GEO Augmented Navigation (GAGAN) system is one of these revolutionary inventions. GAGAN, which was created jointly by the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) and the Airports Authority of India (AAI), has revolutionized airborne navigation. India has completed the first-ever performance-based navigation demonstration for helicopters in Asia using GAGAN satellite technology with a flight from Juhu in Mumbai to Pune. GAGAN offers advantages to many forms of transport as well as public services, extending its advantages beyond aircraft. It improves the GPS system's reliability, precision, and integrity, allowing users to rely on it for all flight phases, from takeoff to landing, within the GAGAN service volume.

#### 2.TRAINING LAUNCH OF AGNI-1 BALLISTIC MIS-SILE- JUNE 3, 2023 Sh

Through successful missile launches, India keeps making tremendous progress in enhancing its strategic defence capabilities. The Strategic Forces Command's latest training launch of the Agni-1 missile from APJ Abdul Kalam Island in Odisha is evidence of the nation's dedication to accuracy and technological improvements.

With the successful training launch of the Agni-1 missile from APJ Abdul Kalam Island in Odisha, India reached yet another significant milestone. The Strategic Forces Command successfully validated and confirmed the operational and technical features of the missile during the launch. The Agni-1 missile demonstrated both its efficiency and India's commitment to improve its capability for strategic deterrence by being able to strike targets with a surprising degree of precision.



#### 3. DERAILMENT IN INDIAN RAILWAYS- JUNE 5, 2023

The Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) published a report in 2022 titled "Derailment in Indian Railways". This research identified a number of flaws and offered numerous suggestions to enhance rail safety. The analysis placed special emphasis on the role that reckless driving and overspeeding play in derailments. Out of a total of 1129 derailments, it was reported that the loco pilots were responsible for 154 mishaps. This emphasized the necessity of the train drivers receiving greater instruction, oversight, and rigorous adherence to safety regulations.

#### 4. REFINING THE CLINICAL ESTABLISHMENTS (REGISTRATION AND REGULATION) ACT- JUNE 5, 2023

The many sorts of clinics and healthcare professionals around the nation will be significantly impacted by this shift. The Refined Act may demand registration for therapy centers, hair transplant centers, skin and cosmetology clinics, and dental cosmetology clinics in addition to hospitals. This action promotes improved accountability and patient safety by guaranteeing that a variety of clinical institutions are included in the Act's scope of application.

#### 5. TRACKING SDG7: THE ENERGY PROGRESS RE-PORT 2023- JUNE 7, 2023

A key component of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, the Sustainable Development Goal 7 (SDG 7) is focused on resolving the world's energy issues. In order to shed light on the advancements made in reaching SDG 7, a new study titled Tracking SDG7: The Energy Progress study 2023 was recently made available. The International Energy Agency (IEA) and other organizations collaborated to create the Tracking SDG7: The Energy Progress Report 2023, emphasizing the significance of precise data collection and analysis to track progress towards

SDG 7.

#### 6.TAMIL NADU GOVERNMENT WITHDRAWS GENERAL CONSENT TO CBI- JUNE 15, 2023

An important event is the decision by the Tamil Nadu government to revoke the Central Bureau of

Investigation's (CBI) permission to conduct investigations in the state. The operation and authority of the CBI have come under scrutiny as a result of this decision, which was made by the home department. The CBI is able to easily look into corruption charges involving central government personnel thanks to the general approval granted to the organization. It makes it easier for the agency to undertake investigations without requesting a specific waiver for every situation. This authorization is meant to hasten and ensure that investigations into corruption go as smoothly as possible.

#### 7.MIZORAM GOVERNMENT'S HIGH-LEVEL COM-MITTEE ON INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS (IDPS)- JUNE 7, 2023

The Mizoram administration has made a great effort to solve the difficulties experienced by Manipur's internally displaced people (IDPs). The High-Level Committee on IDPs has been constituted and is headed by Lalchamliana. An executive committee has also been established to carry out IDP-related decisions. These programmes seek to aid persons impacted by interethnic conflict by offering relief and humanitarian aid. More than 40,000 Myanmarese refugees are currently staying in Mizoram after fleeing their country because of the military junta. In addition, 772 Bangladeshi migrants have sought asylum in Mizoram to escape the Bangladeshi army's assault. Additionally, there are nearly 9,000 IDPs from Manipur who need support and assistance due to ethnic violence.

#### 8. Gol-UNSDCF 2023-2027- JUNE 17, 2023

Together, the United Nations (UN) and the Government of India (Gol) have strengthened their commitment to sustainable development. With the signing of the Government of India-United Nations Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework (Gol-UNSD-CF) 2023–2027, a significant milestone was reached. Through this relationship, we hope to advance the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), advance gender equality, give youth more influence, and safeguard human rights. Aligning with the national vision for development and helping to achieve the SDGs are the main goals of the Gol-UNSDCF 2023–2027. The framework is based on the People, Prosperity, Planet, and Participation strategic pillars. These pillars form the foundation for sustainable development and are interconnected.

## 9.'RESIDENTIAL SEGREGATION AND UNEQUAL ACCESS TO LOCAL PUBLIC SERVICES IN INDIA: EVIDENCE FROM 1.5M NEIGHBORHOODS'- JUNE 17, 2023

'Residential Segregation and Unequal Access to Local Public Services in India: Evidence from 1.5m Neighbor-

hoods' is the title of a recent paper. It has made clear the extent of residential segregation in Indian cities and how it affects disadvantaged groups. Access to essential amenities including primary and secondary schools, healthcare, a piped water supply, electricity, and covered sewers is severely restricted in areas where marginalized communities live.

#### 10.GENDER GAP REPORT, 2023- JUNE 22, 2023

The World Economic Forum's (WEF) Gender Gap Report 2023 offers insightful information on India's progress towards gender parity. India is ranked 127th out of 146 nations in the Gender Gap Report 2023 for gender parity. Despite the modest appearance of this ranking, it marks an eighth-place improvement over the previous year. The nation's dedication to tackling gender inequities is demonstrated by this constructive shift. India has significantly reduced the gender gap overall, with 64.3% of the difference having been bridged. However, India's ranking in terms of economic opportunity and participation is 36.7%, showing the need for more advancements in empowering women in the workforce.

### 11. CHALLENGES AND EFFORTS IN RECOVERING THE TITANIC SUBMERSIBLE- JUNE 22, 2023

A race against time is being waged by teams from all around the world to find a missing submersible and its crew in the huge North Atlantic Ocean. Presumed Human Remains to be Analyzed said by US Coast Guard.

The teams face a number of difficulties, including the submersible's restricted oxygen supply. The need to find the ship and its crew of five grows more urgent by the second. Around 7,600 square miles (20,000 square kilometers) of the North Atlantic are covered by the search effort. It is a difficult undertaking to navigate this vast area down more than two miles. The environment at the ocean's bottom is hostile and severe.


