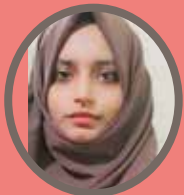

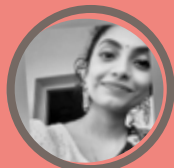

CSR IMPACT STUDY CONDUCTED BY DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WORK (FROM 6 TH - 10 TH 20 - 23)

Department of Social Work, Amrita Vishwa Vidyapeetham conducted CSR Impact study of MCRC from 6th to 10th March 2023. II MSW students of Community Development specialisation were engaged in conducting a series of surveys in a total of 26 villages in and around Karaikudi region. The surveys were a part of the different CSR initiatives undertaken by Shri AMM Murugappa Chettiar Research Centre, Chennai. The various CSR projects include distribution of solar lanterns in the villages where electricity hasn't reached yet, distribution of smokeless chulhas to people who are still dependent on traditional chulhas, distribution of bio-inputs such as Fortified Panchgavya to farmers, etc.

Within these 5 days, the team surveyed a total of 233 beneficiaries with the number of benefits received going up to 293. The team also conducted a couple of Focused Group Discussion with farmers to know more about the issues faced by them. The work done by the team also included preparation of the research tool,

Session one was carried out by Endumathi, Consultant Psychiatrist, Mathi's Mind Care Clinic, Coimbatore. She is part of the Indian Psychiatric Society South Branch and also the chairperson of the Women Empowerment Committee- SAMANWI. She spoke about "Women and Mental Health Issues in Digital Era". 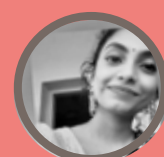

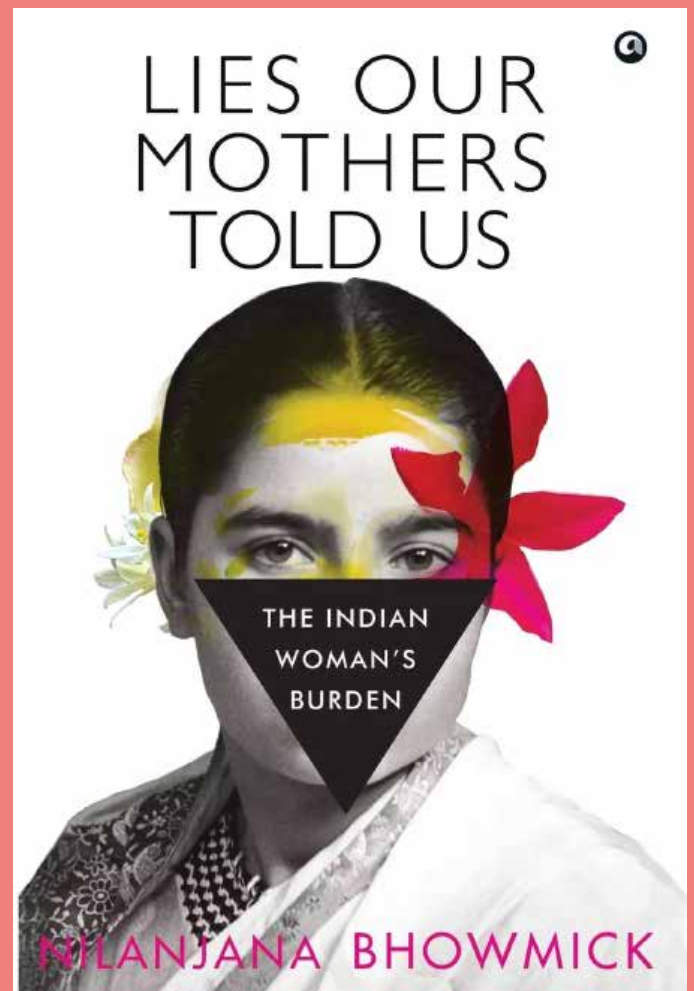
Book Review

Lies Our Mothers Taught Us: The Indian Woman's Burden by Nilanjana Bhocomick

Nilanjana Bhowmick's book *Lies Our Mothers Taught Us: The Indian Woman's Burden* covers the superwoman concept that women face—they are expected to do it all, and if they can't, they are labelled as failures, unfit wives/mothers/women. The book, which was written over a decade, tries to present the tale of the Indian lady through facts and research. Interviews with women aged 15 to 60 contribute to the book's examination of their labour, Leisure, employment, relationships, health, abuse, and loneliness. As a result, it provides a thorough picture of women's life in India. The most engaging parts of the book, however, are frequently the narratives that precede Bhowmick's facts.

Bhowmick's interactions with women from all walks of life and classes—from labouring women in the highlands to those in big cities—are equally worth reading about. The book can be sad at times, and the data sometimes overpowers the thoughts. There is the weight of repetition, which seeks to emphasise a point. That is not to suggest that the book is without promise—there is optimism in the rebellion of a woman who has purchased herself a car, or in the Bibipur model of empowering women via education and symbolic gestures like naming highways, which has been emulated across the country. It tells us that, despite the long and difficult path ahead, change is possible.

These aren't just stories about fictitious women living in exotic locales. This is the story of every Indian woman. As a woman, it's impossible to read this book and not relate to some aspect of it.

HIRBAIBEN IBRAHIMBHAJ LOBI

Hirbaiben Ibrahimbhai Lobi is a social worker and activist from Gujarat, India who has dedicated her life to improve the lives of marginalized communities in her state. 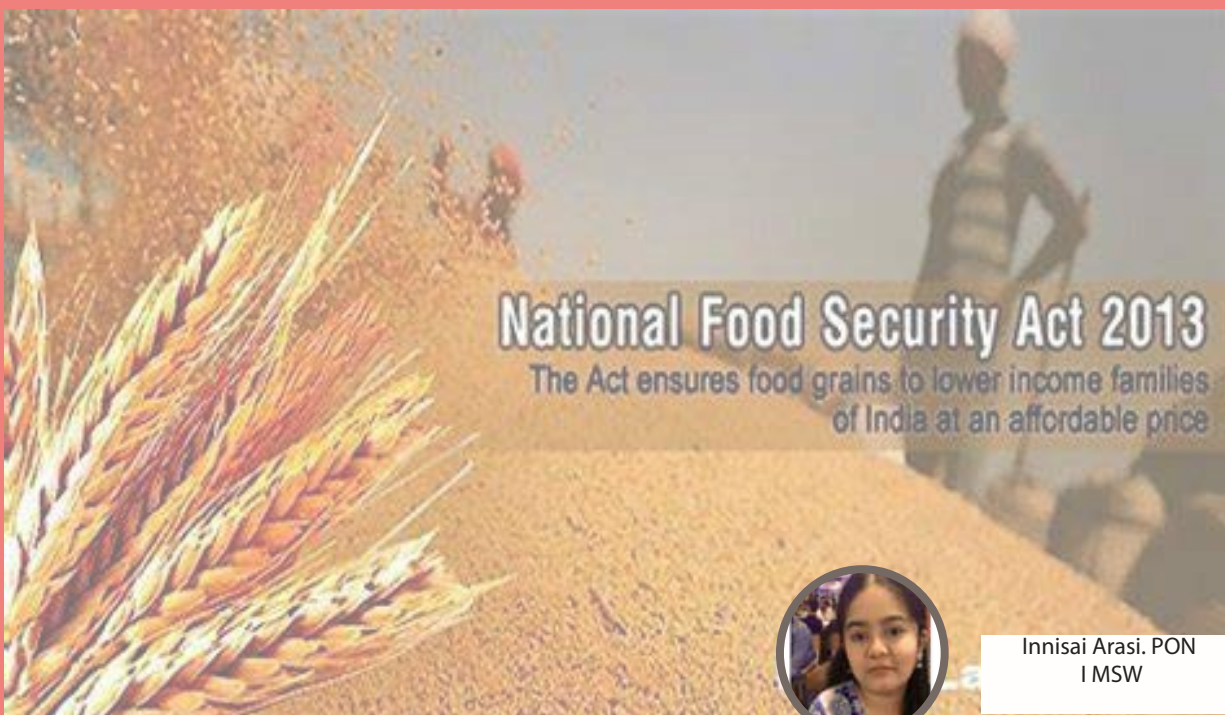
The National Food Security Act (2013)

The National Food Security Act system came out from the basic concept of food security. It is to make sure that all people in the country, should get access to the basic food every day to ensure their active and healthy life and it is characterized by availability, access, utilization and stability of food. Though the Indian judicial does not have any explicit purvey regarding right to food, the basic right to life consecrate in Article 21 of the judiciary may be involved to include right to live with human dignity, in which it also includes the right to food and other basic necessities.

On keeping these aspects in mind, Parliament passed the Act were government has formulated the National Food Security Act, 2013 on 10th September, 2013 with the objective of providing food and nutritional guard in human life cycle approach, by making certain way to purposeful quantity of quality food at affordable cost to people to live a life with respect and dignity. This Act provides for compass of up to 75% of the rural strength and up to 50% of the urban strength for acquiring grant to food products underneath Targeted Public Distribution System (TPDS), thus this covers about two-thirds of the total strength.

The persons who come under this criterion will be ensured to receive 5 Kgs of food grains per person per month at acquiring cost of Rs. 3/2/1 per Kg for rice/wheat/coarse grains. The already existing act called Antyodaya Anna Yojana (AAY) households, which is initiated to contribute poorest of the poor, will be continued to receive 35 Kgs of food products like food grains per household per month.

This Act also plays an important role by targeting the focus on the nutritional care to women and children rather than the meal. The pregnant women, lactating mothers till six months after the child birth will receive their maternity benefit of not less than Rs. 6,000. Children up to 14 years of age will be provided with nutritious meals as per the suggested nutritional standards or systems. If in case there is a situation of non-supply of ensured food grains or meals, the beneficiaries will receive food security allowance. The Act also contains purveys for setting up of disservice redressal mechanism at the district as well as State levels. Separate purveys have also been made in the act for ensuring transparency and accountability.



SCHEMES

Pradhan Mantri Kisan Urja Suraksha evam Utthaan Mahabhiyan (PM-KUSUM)

Pradhan Mantri Kisan Urja Suraksha evam Utthaan Mahabhiyan (PM-KUSUM) Scheme is aimed at ensuring energy security for farmers in India, along with honouring India's commitment to increase the share of installed capacity of electric power from non-fossil-fuel sources to 40% by 2030 as part of Intended Nationally Determined Contributions (INDCs).

The Ministry responsible for this scheme is the New and Renewable Energy Ministry. Initially, the government will distribute 1.75 million off-grid agricultural solar pumps. 10000 Mega Watts Solar plants will be put up on lands that are barren. The state electricity distribution companies, also called, DISCOMS will buy the additional solar power produced by the farmers on barren lands. DISCOMS will get sops to buy this electricity. Tube wells and existing pumps of the government will be converted to run on solar power. Farmers will get a subsidy of 60% on solar pumps. It shall be deposited to their bank accounts directly. This subsidy is going to be shared by the central and state governments. 30% of the cost will be obtained as a bank loan. Hence, only the rest 10% will have to be borne by the farmers themselves. The approved scheme comprised of three components:

Component-A: Addition of 10,000 MW of solar capacity through the installation of small solar power plants of capacity up to 2 MW.

Component-B: Installation of 20 lakh standalone solar-powered agricultural pumps

Component-C: Solarisation of 15 lakh existing Grid-connected Agriculture Pumps

PM-KUSUM scheme is one of the largest initiatives of the world to provide clean energy to more than 35 lakhs farmers by solarising their agriculture pump under components B and C.

Scheme benefits

The scheme will open a stable and continuous source of income to the rural land owners for a period of 25 years by utilisation of their dry/uncultivable land. Further, in case cultivated fields are chosen for setting up solar power project, the farmers could continue to grow crops as the solar panels are to be set up above a minimum height. The scheme would ensure that sufficient local solar/ other renewable energy-based power is available for feeding rural load centres and agriculture pump-set loads, which require power mostly during the day time. As these power plants will be located closer to the agriculture loads or to electrical substations in a decentralized manner, it will result in reduced Transmission losses for STUs and DISCOMS. Moreover, the scheme will also help the DISCOMS to achieve the RPO target. The solar pumps will save the expenditure incurred on diesel for running diesel pump and provide the farmers a reliable source of irrigation through solar pump apart from preventing harmful pollution from running diesel pump. In light of the long waiting list for electric grid connection, this scheme will benefit 17.5 lakh farmers over a period of four years, without adding to the grid load.

Blind people Insurance Scheme in Kerala

STATE GOVERNMENT SCHEME

A programme for the blind has been announced by the Kerala state government. According to this new programme, blind people would receive insurance in their names. This insurance was introduced for the first time. The insurance programme will boost the confidence of those who are blind. They frequently lose hope since they have no insurance plans in their names and because their unemployment makes them Their lives are still in danger as a result, but not anymore. Their lives will no longer be left uninsured and they can rest easy knowing that they stand to gain.

The blind people will feel inspired, which will help them succeed in life. Also, it will provide them with financial help so they may sustain themselves or at least cover a portion of their expenses while they are still students. Because they are still honing their skill set, students are the ones who need the money the most. So, they will benefit from this money during their formative years.

Braille calendars were provided during the ceremony to celebrate the New Year and the inauguration of the programme by NAB. The government will offer financial aid to blind pupils under this programme. They will also be qualified for a life insurance programme in addition to that.

700 visually impaired children will reportedly profit from this programme as of right now. It is only available to students. Students who lack eyes or who have gone blind as a result of trauma in their lives are eligible to benefit from this programme. Students with disabilities who are currently unemployed will benefit from the initiative. Under this plan, the government will provide them with cash assistance. The business and social arm of Amway India, Amway Opportunity Foundation, launched the insurance policy offered under this programme.

CURRENT AFFAIRS

1. e-Shram Portal

e-Shram portal was launched by the Ministry of Union Labour and Employment in August 2021 with the aim of creating National Database for migrant or unorganized workers across India. Universal Account Number (UAN) is generated in the portal that helps those workers to get access to social security and other government initiatives. Recently, Central Government started to link the data from e-Shram portal with Ration Card to get easy access to the benefits provided by the Department of Food and Public Distribution.

2. CE- 20 cryogenic engine

Cryogenic rocket engine is a liquid-fuel engine designed by ISRO and produced by Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL). It uses cryogenic rocket fuel as an oxidizer which requires very low temperature. The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) has successfully completed the flight acceptance hot test for CE- 20 cryogenic engine which is conducted to bring the flight unit to life for the first time and a preliminary test in a rocket launch. This will power the LVM3 launch vehicles for the upcoming Chandrayaan-3 mission. This hot test was carried out at the ISRO Propulsion Complex in Mahendragiri, Tamil Nadu.

3. Exercise Desert Flag VIII

Exercise Desert Flag VIII is a multilateral air exercise organised from February 27 to March 17 this year which involves participation of UAE, France, Kuwait, Australia, UK, Bahrain, Morocco, Spain, the Republic of Korea and US. UAE is hosting the exercise. The Indian Air Force Contingent is taking part in the exercise which includes 110 Air Warriors along with 2 C- 17 Globemaster III aircraft and 5 LCA Tejas. The objective of this exercise is to provide operational exposure to the participating soldiers and the countries will share their best practices. This will also help the participating countries to test the performance of their armed forces.

4. Inauguration of Keeladi Museum

The Keeladi museum was inaugurated by the Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu- Mr. M.K. Stalin in the Sivaganga district. This museum is built on an area of 2ac at a cost of Rs. 18.43cr at Keeladi. It depicts the life of ancient Tamils and the heritage of TN during Sangam Age and has over 15,000 unique artefacts unearthed during different phases of excavations done by the Tamil Nadu State Department of Archaeology since 2018. The carbon dating done at the excavation site confirmed that the Tamil Sangam Era dated back to 800 BCE.

5. Pattaya Mission

The Government of Kerala is planning to establish Pattaya Mission by the end of April which was announced by the Revenue Minister Mr. K. Rajan. Despite the implementation of Land Reforms Act there are still land record problems in Kerala. Cash crop plantations are placed out of land reforms and majority of land were not distributed because of which the government planned to launch Pattaya Mission to tackle land record issues.

6. Cross- Border energy pipeline

India and Bangladesh inaugurate 1st cross-border energy pipeline between these two countries known as India Bangladesh Friendship Pipeline (IBFP) running from Siliguri (India) to Parbatipur (Bangladesh) with a capacity to transport 1 Million Metric Ton Per Annum (MMTPA) of High-Speed Diesel (HSD) to Bangladesh. This helps to strengthen India's relationship with neighbouring countries.

7. Right to Health (RTH) Bill

Rajasthan becomes first state to pass RTH bill allows all residents of the state, the right to avail free Out Patient Department (OPD) services and In Patient Department (IPD) services at all public health centres. The key features of RTH are Inclusivity, Non-discriminatory and Participatory.

8. Bharat 6G Vision

Prime Minister Narendra Modi unveiled Bharat 6G vision document prepared by Technology Innovation Group on 6G which aims to design, develop and deploy 6G network to provide intelligent and secure connectivity. PM also launched 6G research and development test bed.

9. "Governor of the Year" Award- 2023

Central Banking, an International economic research journal had honoured Sakthikanta Das- Governor of Reserve Bank of India as the "Governor of the Year"- 2023. He has been awarded this because of his steady leadership during challenging periods like Covid-19 pandemic, inflammatory pressures due to Russia- Ukraine war.

10. World Tuberculosis Day

World Tuberculosis Day is observed every year on March 24 to raise awareness about the global epidemic of tuberculosis (TB) and the efforts made to eliminate it. The theme for World TB Day 2023 is "Yes! We can end TB!". While addressing One World TB Summit organised by Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) and Stop TB Partnership, Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched various initiatives to eliminate TB like TB-Mukt Panchayat initiative, shorter TB Preventive Treatment and Release of annual TB report titled "Leading the way India TB report 2023".

11. Gaj Utsav 2023

The Indian Government has planned to celebrate the 30th anniversary of Project Elephant with Gaj Utsav which is a two-day event aimed to promote elephant conservation, protect their habitat and corridors, and prevent human-elephant conflicts. It will also ensure the welfare of captive elephants in India. This event will be inaugurated by President Draupadi Murmu on April 9 at Kaziranga National Park in Assam.
